

Let's Pi-Ume-Sha June 24-25-26

This year the 19th annual individual and team championships Pi-Ume-Sha Treaty Days will be celebrating 50 years under the Wheeler-Howard Act as well as the signing of the 1855 Warm Springs Nation Treaty. The three day celebration will feature the Traditional dress parade, prizes in all categories, a stick game tournament, Nathan "Eight-Ball" Jim will emcee the event.

The schedule of events for the celebration can be found on page Contest rules are as follows: 1.

All contests will be in drum order; 2. Registration for contestants will be open until 7 p.m. Saturday, June 5 (final); 3. Contestants must dance in each session to gain points; Full regalia, according to tribal custom; 5. Loss of any regalia will disqualify dancer during dancing competition, number is part of regalia; 6. No tennis shoes, dark glasses or chewing gum; 7. All contestants must be in grand entry at 7 p.m. nightly or will be disqualified, must also be at each afternoon grand entry at 1 p.m.; 8. All con-

testants must be at least 1/4 degree of Indian; 9. Five semi-finalists will be picked at each session, June 24, 25 and 26; 10. Only registered drummers will be paid with register deadline June 25 at 5 p.m.; 11. All judges decisions are final; and 12. Men may only register for an individual contest—Men's straight or fancy.

Lorena Tee-Nuksh (Suppah) Bill

Lorena Tee-Nuksh (Suppah) Bill, 49, died Tuesday, June 13 following a lengthy illness. She was an enrolled member of the Confederated Tribes of Warm Springs and a lifelong resident of the Warm Springs Reservation.

She was born December 1, 1939 at Simnasho, Oregon to Frank and Rena Irene (Wilson) Suppah. She spent her childhood in the Simnasho area. She attended schools in Warm Springs and Madras. On May 14, 1956, she married Johnson Bill of White Swan, Washington. She was a member of the Washut religion. She obtained her G.E.D. and attended Central Oregon Community College for a year of nurses training. Lorena worked as a teacher's aide at the Simnasho Grade School and is credited with being the originator of the Simnasho Mini-Marathon; she was the director of the Discovery Club at the Simnasho school and she also traveled to Hawaii with the Simnasho school students.

Lorena worked as a Longhouse cook, a widow caretaker, official spiritual feast food server, an Indian Echo-er (interpreter of Indian doctor) and she was known as "Iron Horse" for her perseverance and strength as a comforter.

She enjoyed beadworking, root digging, crocheting and braiding

cornhusk work. Lorena had also worked and enjoyed jockeying, champion hoop dancer, stickgame participant, war dancer, round dancer, drummer and culture and heritage instructor.

She was preceded in death by her father (1954); her husband (1958); three brothers, Roosevelt Suppah (1952) Lincoln Suppah (1940) and Benjamin Suppah (1944); and three sisters, Leola Suppah Zamora (1987); Olivia Suppah (1937) and Julia Ann Suppah (1968).

Surviving her are, her mother, Rena Marie Suppah; her children Teresa Nora Suppah, Leslie Bill, Rena Suppah and foster children Aaron Suppah and Chris Suppah; brothers, Franklin Suppah, Delson Suppah, Francis Suppah, Lamont Brown; sisters Arlita Rhoan, Ellen Thompson, Delilah Suppah,

Ellen Squiempnen, Charlotte Shike, Neda Wesley, Eliza Brown Hicks, Marilyn Wagner and Daisy Ike; and relatives, Squiempnen family, the Matthew Suppah family, the James Palmer family, the Frank family (Delbert, Olney, Jacob, Elvis, Lydia and Margaret), Auntie Caroline Tohet, the Tohet family, Andrew David family, Frank Sohapp family, Saluskins, Simon John family, Sheleals, Shippentower, Showaways and the Squally family.

An evening prayer service was held June 14 at the BelAir Colonial Funeral Home in Madras. Dressing ceremonies were held June 15 at the Simnasho Longhouse with Caroline Tohet officiating. Overnight services followed with Wilson Wewa, Jr., officiating. Burial was at the Simnasho Cemetery at sunrise June 16.

Ellen Irene Tha-Nungth (Starr) Heath

Enrolled member and elder of the Confederated Tribes of Warm Springs, Ellen Irene "AI" Tha-Nungth (Starr) Heath, 69, died at her residence, 1700 Foster, Warm Springs, Oregon June 11, 1988.

She was born to Jim Ya-Pau-echa and Marylena Nik-Stai-Us (Thompson) Starr December 25, 1918 at Celilo Falls, Oregon. She was a descendant of the late Chief Tommy Thompson of the Columbia River tribes. She married Walter J. Heath November, 1936 at Union Gap, Washington. They made their home at Celilo Falls moving to Warm Springs in 1957. Mrs. Heath was active in the Warm Springs Indian Culture Camp, tribal fisheries, the tribal Health and Welfare Committee and tribal Enrollment committee. She worked as a historian and researcher for the Warm Springs tribes and the Columbia River tribes. For many years she was known for her work as goodwill representative for the Tribes. She had also acted as an interpreter for the Tribes. Mrs. Heath enjoyed cooking at tribal gatherings and events. She also enjoyed fishing, bead work and sewing. She was a member of the Washut Religion.

Mrs. Heath was preceded in death by her father (7/7/22); her mother (4/19/57); her brothers, Sammie Starr (12/13/49), Thompson Starr (11/19/42), Alba Starr (2/28/49) Gilbert Starr (1/28/24), Harold

Culpus and Kip Culpus; her sisters, We-All-Tump-Tni, Carrie Starr (1916) and Helen Clements; two daughters, Delores Heath (12/13/73) and Sharon Phyllis Heath (2/28/49); one son, Evans Heath (3/12/49); one grandson, Thomas M. Heath and a granddaughter, Kirbena Heath.

Surviving her are her sons, Kirby, William, Walter, Jr., Roosevelt, Christopher Heath and Nelson Ziemont; daughters, Stephanie Burke, Sharon Sharon Crooked Arm, Marylena Picard and Anna Senator; sisters, Ina Tohet, Martha George, Hilda Culpus and Mary Settler; sons-in-law, Richard Crooked Arm and George Picard, Jr.; daughters-in-law, Rebecca Heath, Denise Picard and Mary Bobb; grandchildren, Kirby Heath, Jr., Kevin Heath, Gary Heath, Miles Heath, Reginald Heath, Chuckie Crooked Arm, Jarrod Heath, Heath Crooked Arm, Colleen Seelatsee, Julianne Seelatsee, Stacy Fast Horse, Emmaline Crooked Arm, Gladys Heath and Rima Crooked Arm, Delores Picard, Kaleja Castilja, Dymella Castilja, Heather Picard, LeMinnie Picard, Claressa Picard, Melinda Heath and Tashina Johnson.

Dressing ceremonies were held Monday, June 13 at the Simnasho Longhouse with Indian Shaker Church elders officiating. Overnight ceremonies followed at the longhouse with Levi George officiating, with burial at sunrise at the Simnasho Cemetery Tuesday, June 14.

Elizabeth (David) Smith

Enrolled member of the Confederated Tribes of Warm Springs, Elizabeth "Betty" (David) Smith, 62, died of natural causes at her residence, 2323 Olallie in Warm Springs June 3, 1988.

She was born to Andrew and Winona (Katchia) David in Warm Springs, Oregon March 2, 1926. Both preceded her in death. She lived her entire life in Warm Springs. On September 1, 1946 she married Milan Smith at Warm Springs. She enjoyed sewing, beadworking, crocheting and flower making. She was a member of the Warm Springs Presbyterian Church.

Survivors include her husband; two daughters, Janice Smith Rood and Brenda Smith; three sons, Char-

les Smith, Jackie Smith and Milan Smith, Jr.; two sisters, Amelia Spino and Ernestine Stevens; four half-sisters, Lucinda Green, Roma Cartney, Arlene David and Allegra Tufti; a half-brother, Allison David; an aunt, Caroline Tohet; eight grandchildren and a great-granddaughter.

Dressing ceremonies were held at the Evergreen Chapel in Madras, Oregon Saturday, June 4, 1988 with Margaret Boise officiating. Evening prayer services were held that same day at the Chapel. Dennis Chee Yazzie, 27, died June 7, 1988 at St. Charles Medical Center from injuries he received in a motorcycle accident early that day on highway 26 at milepost 104.8, on the reservation. He was an enrolled member of the Confederated Tribes of Warm Springs.

He was born to Chee and Jeanette (Meanus) Yazzie in San Juan, New Mexico August 29, 1960. He spent his childhood years in New Mexico and moved to the Warm Springs Reservation in the 70s. He attended schools in Warm Springs and Madras, Oregon.

He was preceded in death by brothers, Gilbert Meanus (4/1/52) and David Lee Yazzie (7/14/87)

and a sister, Jennifer Yazzie (3/27/81).

Surviving him are his father Chee Yazzie; his mother Jeanette Meanus; two brothers, Gilbert Yazzie and Preston Meanus; three sisters Winona Lewis, Lucinda Yazzie and Catherine Yazzie, all of Warm Springs.

Dressing ceremonies were held at the BelAir Colonial Funeral Home in Madras, Thursday, June 9, 1988 by Larry Dick and Nelson Wallulatum. Overnight ceremonies were held at the Warm Springs Agency longhouse with Wilson Wewa, Jr. officiating. Burial was June 10 at the Mouth of the Warm Springs River Cemetery.

Althea Henry is the daughter of Ellen Johnson of Warm Springs and Robert Wesley of Yakima, Washington and the granddaughter of the late Alex Henry and Josephine Henry.

She is of Paiute and Yakima descent. Her hobbies are traveling

to powwows and softball games. She would like to return to college in the near future. She stated that by entering the contest she will be supporting her uncle Vernon Henry who is chief of the Warm Springs

"Sah-Pum" is the Indian name of Madras Junior High seventh graders, Ina Jim. She is the daughter of Bruce and Barbara Jim; the granddaughter of Ina Tohet, the late Martha McKinley and Grant and Emily Wahenaka all of Warm Springs.

The young miss is of Warm Springs, Yakima and Nez Perce descent. She is active in softball and enjoys horseback riding, basketball and Indian activities. She said she is a part of the court because she wants to become active in Indian dancing.

A sophomore at Madras High School in Madras, Rena Suppah is the daughter of Delilah Suppah and Rafael Queahpama and the granddaughter of Rena Supah all of Warm Springs. She is active in OSSOM and enjoys dancing. She is of Warm Springs descent. She feels that being on the Pi-Ume-Sha court will help her to grow in her background and her culture.

Fifteen year old, Serina Winishut is a sophomore at Madras High School where she is active in acapella. She is the daughter of Don Winishut, Sr. and Margie Tuckta and the granddaughter of Eugene and Norene Greene and

Pauline Johnson and the late Percy Winishut. She is an enrolled member of the Confederated Tribes of Warm Springs and is of Warm Springs, Wasco, Paiute and Nez Perce descent. She enjoys singing in the choir and dancing at powwows. Serina said that she is looking forward to Pi-Ume-Sha powwow and meeting new people.

entries closing June 25 at 8:30 a.m. and post time at 9 a.m. All riders are required to use a stock saddle. It will be jackpot with all monies paid out (first-50%, second-30% and third-20%). Winners of first and second place will also receive a trophy buckle plus a satin jacket. Second and third places will receive head stall and rein sets plus satin jackets. Fourth and fifth place will also receive satin jackets. The first place winner will receive a yearling colt donated by the Kalama family. The Juanita Bourland Perpetual Trophy will be presented to the winner, to keep possession of the trophy a person must win it three times.

In the junior division the age limit is 15 years and under with an entry fee of \$25. The course will be approximately 5-6 miles long. Entries will close June 25 at 8:30 a.m. with post time at 9:15 a.m. sharp. All riders are required to use a stock saddle. The junior division race will start at the Shaker Church and end there also. The first eight junior riders will receive a T-shirt. Monies will be jackpotted with 50% for first, 30% for second and 20% for third.
