

Warm Springs man arraigned in County Impoundment facilities inadequate

A Warm Springs tribal member and resident, Nancy Smith Zamora, 34, was seriously injured in a single car accident Sunday, July 24 when the car in which she was a passenger left the road and traveled down a 100-foot embankment on the Northwest Pelton Dam Road just south of Pelton Park. The driver of the car, Merris Wallulatum, 23, Warm Springs was being pursued by a Madras City police officer.

balance, Warm Springs Fire and Safety, Warm Springs Search and Rescue, Oregon State Police and Jefferson County Police assisted with the rescue.

Zamora was transported by Air Life to St. Charles Medical Center where she underwent surgery on Sunday. She is currently in St. Charles and is listed in fair condition. Wallulatum was treated at Mt. View Hospital in Madras and then taken to Jefferson County jail. He was arraigned in Jefferson County District Court where he was charged with attempting to elude a police officer, driving under the influence, reckless driving, and no operator's license on July 25. He was appointed a public defender, K. Birnick of Bend. The trial date was set for August 15.

Owners were finally notified that the dog could be released. They came for the dog last week and "were strongly advised to keep the dog restrained to prevent further possible bite injuries to people," says Warm Springs Police spokesperson Carol Wewa.

The concern was particularly appreciated when the dog gave birth to eight puppies, long after its quarantine period had expired. The mixed-breed dog was picked up June 13 for reportedly biting someone. According to Tribal Ordinance #36, enacted 26 years ago by Tribal Council, a dog that bites and causes an "abrasion of the skin" requires a 10-day quarantine to determine whether or not it is rabid.

The dog's confinement period came and went and the dog remained tied to the pipe. The "impoundment facility" didn't provide shelter from the heat and the dog was not receiving food and water.

It was not until Natural Resources people noticed the neglect that the dog finally began receiving care. After a week of restraint Warm Springs fisheries biologist Mark Fritsch alerted the police that the dog needed care. Someone then began dumping buckets of leftover food near the dog.

Not satisfied with the dog's treatment Natural Resources personnel collected money to buy dog food and made certain the dog had fresh water. They also provided a bowl for food and a piece of plywood was set against the wall for shelter.

The dog's rope was finally cut July 7 enabling her to better care for her puppies born June 30.

And for dog owners, a license is required for all dogs kept, harbored or maintained within the boundaries of the Warm Springs Reservation. The license needs to be renewed on or before May 1 of each year.

The ordinance states, "Any dog in violation of provisions of this ordinance...shall be seized and impounded by any tribal police officer or other person specifically appointed for said purpose. Man charged in baby's death


A Warm Springs man, Earl Boise, was arraigned before Federal Court Judge Helen Frye in Portland, Oregon on July 18, 1988 on a charge of murder. The charge is in connection with the death of Boise's month and a half old son, Quinton Dustin Cory Boise who died April 13, 1988 at home. Boise entered a plea of not guilty and is in custody of the U.S. Marshall's office in Portland at this time, according to a spokeswoman from the U.S. At-

orney's office.

According to police reports the baby died at home under suspicious circumstances. Evidence was presented to the Federal Grand Jury and a true bill was returned on July 13. Arraignment was July 18 and the trial date has been set for September 13.

Boise will be represented by federal public defender Ken Lerner of Portland.

Department provides 24-hour service

The Warm Springs Fire and Safety department is available to provide community emergency services 24 hours, seven days a week. They help an average of 700 people a year in many types of emergencies: such as auto accidents and minor injuries. The department has three fire stations; one each at Kah-Nee-Ta, Simnasho and Warm Springs. The station in Kah-Nee-Ta is operated by the resort's security personnel. There is a total of three ambulances, two in Warm Springs and one stationed in Simnasho.

Fire and Safety also inspects houses, at request, for safety hazards. They inspect tribally-owned buildings four times a year. Providing public education in Cardio-Pulmonary-Resuscitation (CPR), first aid and first responder classes are other activities that they organize. Approximately 600 people have been trained in CPR so far. People certified in first aid total approximately 300 and about 150 in first responders. Fire and Safety would like to encourage more people to take some of the classes that they give.

There are eight full-time and four part-time workers currently employed by Fire and Safety. There are also about 20 volunteers.

Ninety-eight percent of the people who are served by the Fire and Safety department are Indians and the rest are non-Indian.

Young man dies after car accident

A Warm Springs man, Kevin Little George, 24, died July 21 at St. Charles Medical Center in Bend from injuries he sustained in a single car accident on July 16.

Little George was a passenger in a car driven by Rosanna Sanders, 21, Warm Springs. According to police reports the car was traveling westbound on highway 26 when it hit the left shoulder at milepost 109.3, went out of control and then crossed over the highway, going over an embankment into the canyon about 200 feet down. All the occupants were thrown from the car. Also passengers in the 1977 BMW were Anthony Davis, 21,

Warm Springs, owner of the car and Urban Gibson, 22, Canyon Trailer Court, Madras.

Little George was transported by Air Life to St. Charles. Sanders, Davis and Gibson were taken to Mt. View Hospital in Madras where they were treated.

The cause of the accident is still

under investigation according to the Jefferson County District Attorney Bill Hanlon. He stated that his office is awaiting the results of blood tests and other evidence from the Oregon State Crime Lab. He said there is the possibility of charges being filed.

fall. Also, a methane gas leak caused by sewage back-up last week at the Day Care caused the closure of that facility for a day. "Because of what happened recently, we never know what's going to happen next," said Mitchell.

The list of inadequacies continues and includes lack of private bathroom facilities in the trailers for children and staff; lack of a "team concept" because care facilities are not under one roof; lack of cooking facilities in all buildings; dangerous traffic patterns and lack of handicap access to the Day Care structure.

A new Early Childhood Education facility is currently on the drawing board and in phase one will be the Education Center, kitchen and maintenance facilities. A referendum for the construction of a new facility is tentatively planned for October of this year.

Tribal Council July 25 that a new facility will enhance independence and self-sufficiency of family units and single parents; will improve efficiency, effectiveness and quality of all services; will ensure proper health and safety of the children and will improve services to the developmentally disadvantaged such as at-risk infants and handicapped preschoolers. Also, children will develop better communication and social skills for public school and will have better self-esteem and self-confidence. Parents will be able to participate in training that will enable them to better work with their children.

Also, some parents don't complete high school or employment training programs because they have no reliable childcare available.

The next issue of Spilyay will carry a more in-depth look at childcare services available on the reservation.
