1. I'd like to know why there are non-enrolled Senior Citizens living in our Senior homes?

The Senior Program operates 28 single family housing units on the reservation exclusively for use by Senior Citizens. Those units are

provided on a rent-free basis to seniors who apply for housing to the Health and Welfare Committee. Twenty of those units are under HUD regulations and therefore open to any senior, tribal or nontribal member, and eight are tribally-owned for exclusive use by senior tribal members.

2. Did the tribe buy Cadillacs for all the mill bosses?

No...I talked with both purchasing and agents from the mill and the tribe, they agreed the tribe or mill has never purchased a Cadillac for anyone.


