

Seminole to host Scout seminar

The American Indian Scouting Association will hold its 32nd annual seminar for youth and adults at the College of Boca Raton, Boca Raton, Florida from July 15 to July 19, 1989. The host tribe will be

the Seminole Tribe of Florida. AISA is a unique collaboration between Indian tribal leaders, educators, and two of our nation's leading youth agencies—Girl Scouts of the USA and Boy Scouts of

America. This national organization was formed to address issues facing today's Indian youth and to provide training and leadership opportunities for American Indian youth. The American Indian Scouting Association seeks to enable American Indian youth to develop their talents and capabilities so they will be able to maintain their cultural identities while building bridges which will allow them to be successful and productive members of both societies.

Seminar participants include both Indian and non-Indian youth (ages 12 to 17) and adults, who explore strategies for youth development and improvement of life in Indian communities through Girl and Boy Scouting programs and services. In four days of workshops and activities, the seminar also includes a sharing of tribal traditions by participants, through native dress, dancing, music, sports and a tour of the host tribe's communities. A highlight of the seminar is the awarding of the national American Indian Youth Award and the Francis X. Guardipee Grey Wolf Award, which recognizes distinguished service to Indian youth.

Adult workshops assist adults responsible for leadership and administration of youth programs by providing training and a forum for the exchange of ideas.

Seminar fee includes room and board and membership in the American Indian Scouting Association, and will be \$135 for adults and \$115 for youth.

Three men arrested

Three men were arrested March 12, 1989 on the Warm Springs reservation. Arrested were Angel Naevas Nunez, age 32; Elias Lopez Perez, age 18 and an unidentified juvenile, age 17. The trio gave an address of Boring, Oregon.

Sergeant Oliver Kirk, in the process of assisting a motorist on Highway 26 near mile post 96.5, was following routine policy and brought the subjects in to interview at the Warm Springs police department. Kirk recognized one person to be involved in drugs. After positive identification had been made, corrections officer Dave Hardman searched the subjects and found in their possession five eight-balls of

cocaine (this is 1/8 ounce each), valued at approximately \$1,150.

BIA Agency Special officer Rob Moran was contacted because he is a member of the Inter-Agency Narcotics team. Moran interviewed the subjects after which subjects were arrested and cited for possession of a controlled substance and delivery of a controlled substance to sell on two counts.

The two adults were booked and lodged at the Jefferson County jail while the juvenile was cited and released to an adult.

Confiscated was \$701 in currency and one 1980 Chevrolet Sedan. All three subjects were expelled from the Warm Springs reservation.

Saturday

Saturday morning activities will begin with the Traditional Dress Parade at 10:30 a.m. Judging will take place before the parade.

The afternoon session will begin with grand entry at 1:00 p.m. Contests will start with the Teen Girl's Round Dance (12-16 years of age), first place receiving \$50, second \$40, third \$30, fourth \$20. "Kussa" Round Dance will be held for dancers 60 years and older, who are encouraged to dance in full dress. Participants in this event will receive an honorarium in appreciation.

The Ol' Warriors War Dance for 60 years and older will be held next. Afternoon activities also include a Rodney Mitchell Memorial with a Fancy War Dance Contest. A trophy, jacket and \$1,000 will be awarded to the winner.

Also to be held is the Kussa & Lily One-Time Memorial Team Dance with \$1,200 being awarded to the winner. Again five semi-finalists will be picked for the men's and women's places. Immediately following an open give-away will take place.

The evening session will begin with grand entry at 7:00 p.m. Registration books will then close at that time. Girl's traditional was dance will take place for girls ages 12-16. First place will be awarded \$90, second \$70, third \$40, fourth \$30, fifth \$20. Next the Boy's Straight War Dance for ages 12-16 will take place with prizes awarded comparable to the girl's Traditional War Dance.

The Women's Team Round Dance will be held for ages 17 years and older with three women to a team. First place winners will receive \$375, second \$300, third \$225, fourth \$150. Men's Team Dance Open contest will be last contest Saturday evening and first place winners will receive the same amount as contestants in the previous contest.

Sunday, June 25, grand entry

will begin at 2:00 p.m. Five semi-finalists will be picked at the start from both men and women individuals. Sunday afternoon will begin with Men's Straight dance for ages 17 years and older. First place will receive \$400, second \$300, third \$200, fourth \$100 while fifth will get \$50. The Women's Individual Straight War Dance will take place next for ages 17 years and older with prizes the same as Men's Straight Dance winners. The Men's Individual Fancy War Dance will then take place for ages 17 years and older followed by the Women's Fancy Shawl Dance for ages 17 years and older. Both will be awarded the same amount as prizes for the Men's Straight Dance.

Ada (Walsey) Polk, age 68 died at the Mt. View hospital due to an extended illness. She was an enrolled member of the Confederated Tribes of Warm Springs. Ada was born August 13, 1921 to William and Netti (Ike) Walsey in Warm Springs. She attended school in Warm Springs and Chemawa Indian School in Salem. Ada enjoyed beadworking, traveling to powwows and raising her grandchildren. She was a member of the Shaker Church before joining the Longhouse.

Preceding her in death are sons, Vernon Polk, who died October 3, 1971; Johnnie Polk, who died October 21, 1972; her father, who died February 3, 1956; her mother, who died October 4, 1939; a brother, James Walsey, who died May 6, 1989; a great-grandson, Marlo Polk-Adams, who died February 21, 1989 and a granddaughter, Rosalie Polk, who died September 23, 1970.

Degradable bags
