Visiting tribes from most parts of the western United States are also on hand vying for some of that prize money that is so attractive at all powwows across the country.

The Pi-Ume-Sha powwow is just one of the many, many powwows held each weekend. There are those people who make quite a living going from one to the other, dancing for prize money. This is not the first powwow this year as there have been several held already in different parts of the country. So, things were really "happening" around here for a few days.

Besides the powwow there were several other activities that took place. There was the annual memorial endurance horse race which was approximately 14 miles in length. There were runs of 10, six and three miles in length put on by the Warm Springs Reservation Runners. Another big attraction was a 16-team softball tourney for both men and women. A slow-pitch double elimination tournament was also held.

The Warm Springs rodeo club had a two-day rodeo with the major rodeo events with some added attractions. This past weekend was just full of activities. While at the powwow, one could view all the hand-crafted Indian jewelry. View the stick games along with a good Indian taco. With all the activities, everyone had quite a time.
