Free blood pressure, sugar tests

Free blood pressure and blood sugar tests will be sponsored by Mountain View Hospital and Nursing Home later this month. The screening will be offered from 9:00 a.m. until 11:00 a.m. on Tuesday, February 27 at the hospital and at the same time on Wednesday, February 28 at the Culver City Hall.

The hospital staff encourages area residents to take advantage of the free screenings. The tests are

done on a first come, first serve basis and usually take only a few minutes. They may be helpful in detecting signs of hypertension or diabetes.

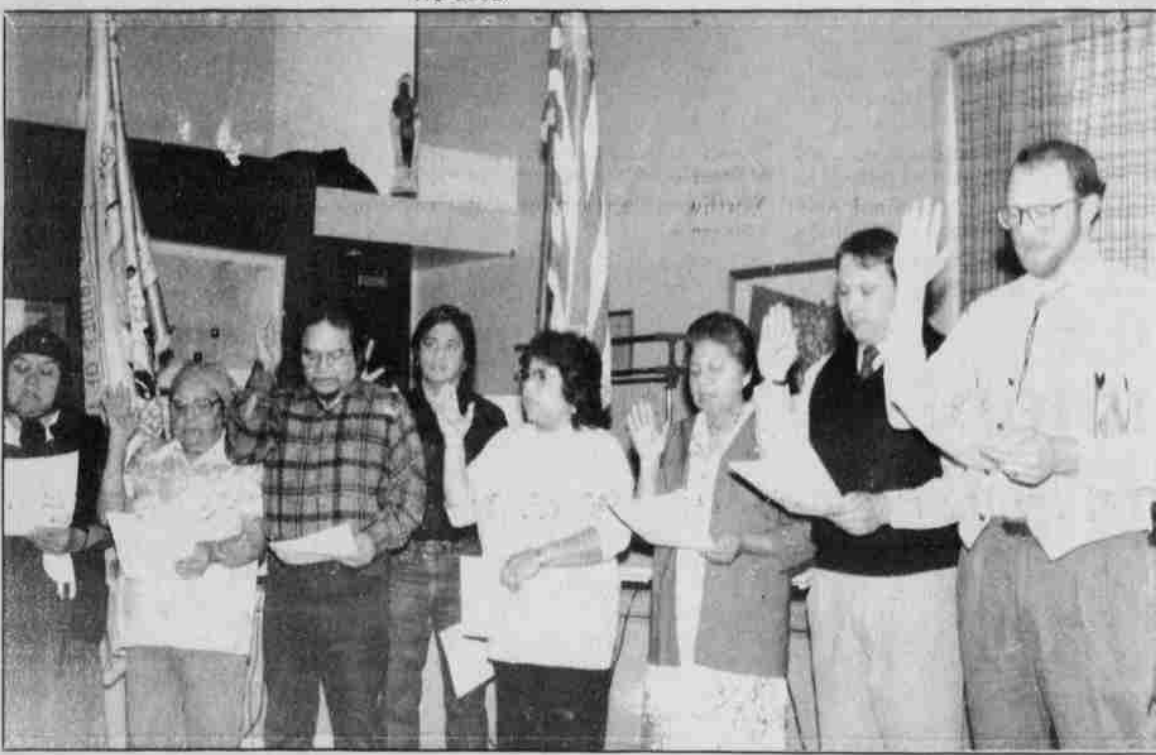
