## Win prizes, become fit during health campaign

The Wellness/Prevention office is sponsoring a "Health Is Good Medicine" campaign through which community members and employees can improve their physical and mental health while at the same time earn credits toward completing the Medicine Wheel. A completed Medicine Wheel will earn participants a chance to enter drawings that will feature health-oriented prizes. Participants will have three months to complete a Wheel.

The Wellness/Prevention office in cooperation with the Wellness committee came up with the idea of the Medicine Wheel after months of contemplation. The Wheel symbolizes healthy lifestyles and improved mental and physical health.

Participants, for \$5, will receive a Wheel on which they will record their various good health practices. Numerous activities will be considered as part of the wellness activities. As participants complete the various activities, they will fill in the squares that make the circle of the Wheel. Once the circle is filled in, participants, if they choose, can obtain another Wheel for \$1 and begin filling it in.

When the completed Medicine Wheel is turned in, the participant's name will be entered in a drawing for one of several prizes. Drawings will be held quarterly. Participants may enter more than once for each drawing, depending on the number of activities they complete. At the end of the fourth quarter, there will be the regular fourth quarter prizes in addition to a special luncheon that will honor all who worked hard throughout the year.

To qualify for the year-end drawing, participants must have completed at least two Medicine Wheels at some time throughout the year and participated in at least one other major event such as the Kah-Nee-Ta Mini-Marathon, the Hood-to-Coast run, the Reservation Relay, the Mother's Day Weekend Volks-walk, the Pole, Pedal, Paddle event, the George Wilson Memorial Run or any other pre-approved major event.

Following are the numerous activities in which people can participate and earn credit toward filling their circles.

**Health Activities—**  
 Blood pressure, cholesterol and glucose checks; dental, visual or hearing exam; lower saturated fat intake for one week, lose one pound, use a seat belt for one week, switch

to diet pop for one week; have a health risk appraisal completed, lipid profile, female gynecological exam, mammogram or have a complete physical exam.

**Recreation Activities—**  
 Participate for at least 30 minutes in volleyball, roller or ice skating, downhill skiing, horseback riding, badminton, softball, golf, bowling, canoeing or rafting.

**Exercise Activities—**  
 Credit will be given for these

exercises: jogging, swimming, cycling, exercise bike, aerobics/jazzercise, jumping rope, cross country skiing, brisk walking, weight training, chair exercises, dancing, tennis, racquetball/handball, basketball/soccer, mowing the lawn, yard work, chopping wood or rowing. (Length of participation varies with each activity.)

Participants will also gain extra health credits if they stop smoking and/or stop drinking for good.

Ruby Dean Leno

Ruby Dean Leno, born to George and Kathryn (Kershner) Dean in Tacoma, Washington March 5, 1915, died March 13, 1990 in Madras. Ruby was an enrolled member of the Yakima Nation and moved to Warm Springs from Salem in 1939.

Ruby attended Chemawa Indian School. Following graduation, Ruby attended the University of Nebraska on a full tuition scholarship. She also attended Willamette University in Salem.

Ruby married Edwin "Buster" Leno, Sr. December 5, 1936. They made their home in Warm Springs until they moved to Madras in 1975. While employed, Ruby worked as chief accountant for the BIA and as executive secretary to secretary/treasurer Ken Smith.

Ruby enjoyed crossword puzzles, going to garage sales, her family, flower gardening and reading. She served on the Jefferson County Public Welfare commission, was a 4-H club leader, served as a home service representative for Jefferson County Red Cross and served on the Warm Springs public school board. She was also an assistant

girl scout leader.

Ruby was preceded in death by her husband in 1981, her parents and three brothers.

She is survived by three daughters, Patricia Leno-Baker of Warm Springs, Lorraine Crowley and Gwen Darling, both of Madras. A son, Mike Leno, Sr. also survives.
