Bulls- 1. Smith Condon, 63; 2-4. Split to winner.



The annual All-Indian Rodeo is set for June 8, 9 and 10, 1990, at White Swan, with performances starting on Friday night at 7 p.m.,

Saturday and Sunday at 1:30 p.m. This is a duel sanctioned affair with the IRCA of Alberta, Canada. The W.S.I.R.A. events will include bareback, saddlebrone, bullriding, calf roping, steer wrestling, team roping, cow milking and girls barrel racing. There is a \$600.00 added to each event, with the entry fee of \$50.00 per event. Books opening June 4, and closing June 5, the office hours are from 9:00 a.m. to 9:00 p.m., call backs June 7th from 6:00 p.m. to 9:00

There will be a long go short go and the top ten to compete on Sunday. There will be a limit in the bull riding which is 48. Charges are contestant fee of \$7.00, and the electric eye for the barrel racers is

Calcutta, Sunday 10 a.m. with events Bull riding, saddle bronc, team roping, steer wrestling, Sr. Barrel racing and old timer breakaway roping.


