Upon execution of search warrants, a small quantity of marijuana and over \$1,250 worth of cocaine were seized along with other paraphernalia. The cocaine was packaged and ready for resale to individuals in the Warm Springs community.

A 33-year-old Warm Springs man died shortly after falling out of the back of a pickup near the Agency Longhouse August 13.

Alton "Timmy" Heath was riding on the edge of a pick-up bed while it was on Kot-num Road near Kalama Lane. Heath fell out and struck his head on the pavement after which the driver, James Wesley, Jr. immediately turned around and picked Heath up. He and two others, Custer Wallulatum and Erwin Stwyer, took Heath to Fire and Safety. Heath was then taken to the IHS clinic where he died. An autopsy determined the cause of death to be a concussion from his falling and hitting the pavement.

Stwyer and Wesley were detained for investigative purposes and released the following day. Charges of driving under the influence are pending against Wesley.
