POSITION	DESCRIPTION
Secretary III Community Counseling	Applicant must be free from dysfunctional use of alcohol and illegal drugs. Provides full range of secretarial services for the department including typing, filing and maintain confidentiality.
Children's Protective Service Worker (CPS)	Position works with families designated as abused and/or neglected or are at risk by abuse or neglect. Requires knowledge of the dynamics of abusive or neglectful families and how to treat the family using case management techniques. Stress management is also important due to the nature of the work. A criminal background check is required due to the sensitivity of the work. Worker must be free from dysfunctional use of alcohol and illegal drugs. Minimum education of Associates degree required with three to five years experience. BA degree preferred.
Engineering Technician (Utilities)	Must be high school graduate, six years experience, plus two years vocational training or equivalent. Must have valid Oregon drivers license.
Apprentice Engineering Technician (Utilities)	Learn HVAC trade through Oregon State Apprenticeship program, transport and install various parts. Work and learn from engineering technicians. Maintain high level of interest in heating ventilating refrigeration and cooling trade. This is a training position only and is tribal member preference. All candidates must complete career profile and assessment with Employment Services prior to interview.
Judge's Secretary (Court)	Applicant must be poised, efficient, personable and hard working. Excellent secretarial skills are required. Prior experience in a law-related field is helpful but not necessary. Step and salary within grade are negotiable based on skills. Temporary two-year appointment.
Firefighter (16 positions)	Works various hours, must be able to pass physical exam and step test. Oregon drivers license required.
25 Temporary/On-Call Forest Crew Members (Fire management)	Required to be available when requested, willing to be away from home at times for up to 21 days, must be in good physical condition, willing to work as a team member with other workers, be able to run a mile and a half in 11 minutes 40 seconds, and pass step test with a score of 45.
Health Educator	Incumbent provides educational services to Warm Springs Indian population and the IHS Service Unit health care staff where appropriate. Assess the needs for health education based upon the social, cultural, medical and environmental characteristics that best describe the tribal population. Must have successfully completed 1 year of graduate study in public health education which resulted in the MPH degree from a school of public health accredited by the American Public Health Association. Must have 1 year experience in health education.
On-Call Secretary (Finance)	Basic office skills, ability to work with public, confidentiality, dependable, knowledge of tribal organization and surrounding area. Flexible and should be available by telephone.
On-Call Corrections Officer (Police Dept.—2 positions)	Works various hours, High School diploma or GED required, valid drivers license, at least 21 years old, no misdemeanor or felony convictions within one year prior to hire.
Police Officer-Simnasho	High school education, pass BPST training. Must be at least 21 years of age and have a valid drivers license. Must have no record of felonies and no misdemeanors within one year. Must complete and submit a physical examination form with application.
Maternal and Child Health Specialist (Community Health Promotion)	MCH specialist shall be responsible for the direction of the Tribal Maternal Child Health Program. Should provide preventive maintenance and family planning service, home visits, consultation referrals, conduct/coordinate specialty clinics, plan, develop and administer the program budget, compile/complete special assignments.
Mechanic Mechanic Trainee (WSAI)	Mechanic aptitude test required, must be motivated to do an outstanding job, dependable and be able to work with many personalities. (Possibilities job could be part-time).
Power Sewing Machine Operators (WSAI)	Must have desire to learn. Able to communicate well and have positive thinking. WSAI will train for existing positions.
Prevention/Training (Fire & Safety)	Must have valid Oregon license, certified E.M.T. by State of Oregon, basic Fire-fighter certificate, prefer Instructor I certificate.
Forestry Technician (Log Scaler)	Must have a valid driver's license, two years general work experience, one year experience in outdoor field forestry work, a past record showing dependability and punctuality.

Four arrested

On Thursday, August 9, the Narcotics Interdiction Team of the Warm Springs Police Department successfully concluded a narcotics investigation with the arrest of four individuals. Two tribal members and two non-tribal members were charged in tribal court with a total of 12 criminal charges.

Upon execution of search warrants, a small quantity of marijuana and over \$1,250 worth of cocaine were seized along with other paraphernalia. The cocaine was packaged and ready for resale to individuals in the Warm Springs community.

Man dies after fall

A 33-year-old Warm Springs man died shortly after falling out of the back of a pickup near the Agency Longhouse August 13.

Alton "Timmy" Heath was riding on the edge of a pick-up bed while it was on Kot-num Road near Kalama Lane. Heath fell out and struck his head on the pavement after which the driver, James Wesley, Jr. immediately turned around and picked Heath up. He and two others, Custer Wallulatum and Erwin Stwyer, took Heath to Fire and Safety. Heath was then taken to the IHS clinic where he died. An autopsy determined the cause of death to be a concussion from his falling and hitting the pavement.

Stwyer and Wesley were detained for investigative purposes and released the following day. Charges of driving under the influence are pending against Wesley.

Parent involvement noteworthy
