

Some thought they wouldn't get past the highly publicized Central team who are three time cham-pions (1988, 1989 and 1990).

The Madras White Buffaloes were outstanding and superb in every respect giving the Cottage Grove Lions all the problems they could handle before falling by a single point shy for the state championship. They had the Cottage Grove Lions on pins and needles at the closing moments of the game and with the luck for them, time ran out on the Buffs, giving them a one point win.

The Buffaloes outclassed the No. I ranked Cottage Grove team in the final quarter but there just wasn't enough time to really put them away. The Madras White Buffaloes jumped right out to a 14-8 first quarter lead, and at half-time extended the lead to 24-18. In the third quarter the Buffs jumped out to a 39-24 lead. For a moment the Panthers went on a prowl and didn't see any action during the scored 23 points in the final quarter
