# "Spilyay Speaks"



It is obvious that the National Congress of American Indians has improved with age. In its 48 years, NCAI has fine-tuned their operations and become an active proponent for Indian tribes throughout the country. However, in their desire to provide a comfortable place in which to conduct their annual convention, NCAI forgot the very people they are in business to serve.

Warm Springs sent nearly 40 individuals to the convention, including Tribal Council and committee members and other support staff. A conservative estimate shows that the Tribe spent over \$25,000 on registration and air fare fees alone. Add to that an indeterminable sum for lodging

and meals. (One night's lodging at the Hyatt, the site of the convention, was \$93.50 plus a \$75 deposit.) Some Warm Springs delegates opted to move from the Hyatt to more reasonably priced accomodations.

Warm Springs has long been at the forefront in dealing with Indian issues. The large delegation in San Francisco confirms the fact that the Tribe is concerned not only about issues directly affecting Warm Springs, but all Indian concerns. It's unfortunate that such a high price was paid to make sure their voice was heard in the Indian arena.

Shame on you NCAI for selecting such an unreasonably expensive convention site. Get real. Money is tight. If your organization is truly committed to improving conditions for Indian tribes, then rethink your strategy. Get back to the basics. Perhaps Indian business should be conducted on Indian land (and not Palm Springs, either!) Convention attendees heard repeatedly during the week that a united front is the best way to confront problems in Indian country. Continued support of your organization should be contingent upon your efforts to provide a much more cost efficient way in which to conduct the very business that unites tribes.

Open your ears and hear with common sense in your hearts. Tribes are in financial trouble. How can tribes justify spending thousands to attend a meeting if that expense can be equated with, and used for, an entire program or three jobs that serves their people.

Again, shame on you!

CPS is recruiting families who are interested in providing specialized care to children who cannot live in their home. The two areas we are recruiting for are foster homes for special needs children who are drug or alcohol affected and require special nurturing and medical care. These are typically young children who are born with fetal-alcohol syndrome or require special care due to parental neglect. CPS has a special higher rate for these women so that the caretaker can be free to provide full time care.

The second area is for adolescents who are in need of special care and supervision. These homes will provide close supervision to these children and will be responsible for primarily female adolescents. A special rate is available for the care of these children. The present plan is to pay a base rate of \$363.00 per month per child with an additional \$10-\$15 per day per child depending on the child's special needs.
