and Stumbaugh who has been working in Warm Springs full-time since the consultants began work at the mill, is now acting production manager, replacing Gallagher. Sanford will oversee operations in the log yard and all other divisions and will coordinate schedules of species to be run through the plants. He will also oversee an "in-plant training" program that will include five or six employees who have been laid off. The training will enable employees to advance, said Sanford.

Last year, said Towe, WSFPI had 12 drivers and a total of 10 trucks. "Now were down to one driver and two trucks," he said. One truck, a flatbed, will be used to haul lumber to the loading dock to Madras, and the other, a truck that resembles a chip truck, will be used to haul shavings to Bend. Hopefully, the other eight trucks will be sold.

Those employees who were laid off were offered the opportunity to partake in a training session through the Central Oregon Interagency Council (COIC). According to Ted Veramonte, eight individuals signed up for the session. Initially, four sessions were to be scheduled, but because of low interest, future sessions will be scheduled only if former employees contact COIC.

The first grant is the Social Services Block Grant, otherwise known as Title of the Social Security Act. This grant/contract is awarded to the states and required negotiation with the State of Oregon, Children's Services Division. The grant award to Warm Springs is \$37,614. These

and Development Block Grant from the Department of Health and Human Services. This particular grant award is \$83,500. This grant is for the development of child care resources on the reservation. Under a collaborative agreement with the Department of Education, CPS will turn all funds and administration over to Early Childhood/Day Care Program. CPS will provide home evaluations, background checks, and certification of homes or centers. Education will provide the actual disbursement of funds.

The third grant/contract is a contract with the Bureau of Indian Affairs under Public Law 93-638. BIA has awarded the Tribes \$30,000 of the Child Abuse Initiative funding from Congress. The purpose of this grant is to provide training for staff and foster parents in preventing abuse and neglect and remedying problems that bring children into foster care. Under this contract CPS will purchase intensive treatment for children who have severe emotional/behavioral problems.

Commercial license training scheduled

The Confederated Tribes of Warm Springs and Central Oregon Community College presents: Commercial Drivers License Training, January 21, 23, 28, 30, upstairs in the Old Boys Dorm from 1 to 5 p.m.

Do I need a CDL? If you drive a commercial motor vehicle, you need a Commercial Drivers License. This includes diesel truck drivers, bus drivers, drivers carrying hazardous materials, vehicles with weight of more than 26,000 pounds, and drivers carrying 16 people or more.

Where can I go to get a CDL? Anyone who registers through the COCC Center for the CDL training can take the test in Warm Springs on January 30, 1992. There are 7 different tests offered depending on the type of license you are interested in.

How much does it cost? There will be a \$59 registration fee for the course. Each test costs \$3.00 (maximum of \$18) for the written portion. There is an additional \$30 issuance

fee for the license. Each driving skill test costs \$56. Most people who have driven or are currently driving commercial vehicles will not be required to take the driving skill portion of the test.

How do I register? Registration for

the CDL training began January 2. Stop by the Old Boys Dorm to register.

Student scholarships available

COCC Presidential Scholarships are awarded to Native Americans. Four scholarships of \$1,250 per academic year are available, with the possibility of renewal for a second academic year. Qualified Native American students are encouraged to apply. The deadline for applications is January 31, 1992.

To qualify:

1. Applicants must be Native American.
2. Applicants must have completed at least 12 credit hours of college course work with a minimum college cumulative GPA of 2.5 greater.
3. Applicants must enroll full-time in a degree or certificate program at COCC (minimum 12 credits).
4. Applicants must submit evidence of achievements in academic, cultural, athletic, student leadership, civic or personal pursuits.
5. Applicant must submit a COCC Presidential Scholarship for Native Americans Application Form and required documents by the published scholarship deadline.

To Maintain:

1. Applicant must earn a quarterly grade point average of 2.5 or greater.
2. Applicant must complete a minimum of 12 credit hours each quarter.
3. Academic eligibility is subject to COCC Uniform Probation Con-

dition.

Scholarship assistance available

2. Applicants must possess a high school diploma or GED certificate.

4. Applicants must demonstrate need.

To Maintain:

1. Applicant must make satisfactory progress toward a degree as defined by COCC Student Financial Aid Department standards.
