## Bull trout require pristine habitat

The Oregon Chapter of the American Fisheries Society recently voted to petition the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service for a status review of bull trout. Salvelinus confluentus, or bull trout, were once found throughout Oregon's interior but are now limited to a few remaining headwaters. The char reside close to the Warm Springs Reservation in Lake Billy Chinook and in the cold waters of the Metolius River and have been found in the Upper Klamath system, upper Willamette and the upper reaches of the John Day, Grand Ronde and Imnaha Rivers..

Habitat requirements for bull trout include very cold water with pristine, high quality streams, and unrestricted interbasin migrations. Some bull trout may spend their entire lives as residents in small streams, others migrate to larger waters where they grow rapidly. At age 4-6, most migratory bull trout mature and move back upstream to spawn. Major factors responsible for the decline or loss of bull trout populations include passage problems; interactions with other species, particularly hybridization and competition with introduced brook trout; overharvest: and climactic change.

## AFS petitions for bull trout review

The Endangered Species Act, habitat restoration and The Oregon Agricultural Practices Act were part of discussions at the 29th Annual Meeting and Symposium of the Oregon Chapter of the American Fisheries Society. Three days of work-shops and discussions at The Inn of the Seventh Mountain near Bend allowed for the presentation of professional papers and a look at political issues facing Oregon's natural re-

The meeting also resulted in the approval by vote to petition the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service for a status review of the bull trout, a preliminary step toward a possible listing as threatened or endangered. Status review is the first step in the federal

endangered species process. The Fish

and Wildlife Service has 90 days

from receipt of the petition to deter-

mine whether it has technical merit

to warrant review and one year after that to make the review. Also at the meeting, Round Butte Hatchery on the Deschutes River received special recognition for its innovative techniques in taking eggs from wild steelhead and rearing smolts. Portland General Biologist Don Ratliff who works at the Pelton-Round Butte Project was named Fishery Worker of the Year for his work with various agencies including the Confederated Tribes of Warm Springs in fisheries programs and recently for his work in research and collecting data on bull trout.

# **Old Days**

The Plute Indians

Those who came over from the Simcoe Agency last winter are still here. Your order of Feb 15" 1881 was made known to them immediately, but they made the excuse that what few horses they had were very poor. Lately their excuse has been that they had no means to return with, to pay ferriage, and procure subsistence along the road. They are very unwilling to return, and may have to be forced to go. The difficulty I have in this direction, cannot be the one that has prevented Agent Wilbur from turning over to me the families of the Plute Indians properly belonging to this Agency. Nearly a year has passed since he was furnished funds and instructed to bring them to the Dalles where our teams would meet them. Either all the Piutes of this Agency should be taken over to Simcoe, or else the families above referred to be brought over to this Agency. Either arrangement will be satisfactory to me.

#### Moral and Retigious Work

There have been no meetings of the Council, during the month, and no crimes punished or to punish. The Sabbath services have been regularly kept up, and interest manifested. Temperance is growing to be one of the fixed principles with most of the Indians, and a drunken Indian is seldom heard of, and never been here.

John Smith's monthly report for July 31, 1881, contains an interesting description of the activities of the Indian police.

> Warm Springs August 1" 1

I have the honor to submit the following as my report of the nature and progress of the work under my direction at this Agency during the month ending July 31" 1881.

#### The Indian Population

This has been changing and varied as to numbers residing upon the reservation, continuously during the month. This season of the year often brings a dearth of population for it is generally the height of the fishing season, and being in between the care of their gardens, and the harvest time, most of them find it desirable and pleasant to take a trip to The Dalles, and put up their annual supply of salmon, and procure their seasons supply of clothing, groceries, etc.

According to the physician's report, we have lost one in population since two died, and but one was born. Whole number treated 34. Restored 25.

Remaining 9, of which a part a [sic] chronic cases.

#### The Day and Boarding School

has not been in session during the month owing [sic] the thinness of the population, and small number of scholars. The early part of the month was spent as the usual summer vacation by the scholars, and the teachers have been given needed rest and recreation during what is one of warmest months. The school will again be resumed this month.

## The Saw Mill

has been run constantly during the ?????? days of the month, cutting upwards of 15,000 ft of lumber, mostly for Indians.

## The Grist mill

has only run as grists were brought. It is now in better repair, and will do better work than for many years, if it ever has excelled it: present condition.

## The Apprentices

have made satisfactory progress, especially the Asst Sawyer and Asst Blacksmith. They seem to have a natural adaptation for their work. information for the Old Days column is submitted by Warm Springs tribal attorney Jim Noteboom.
