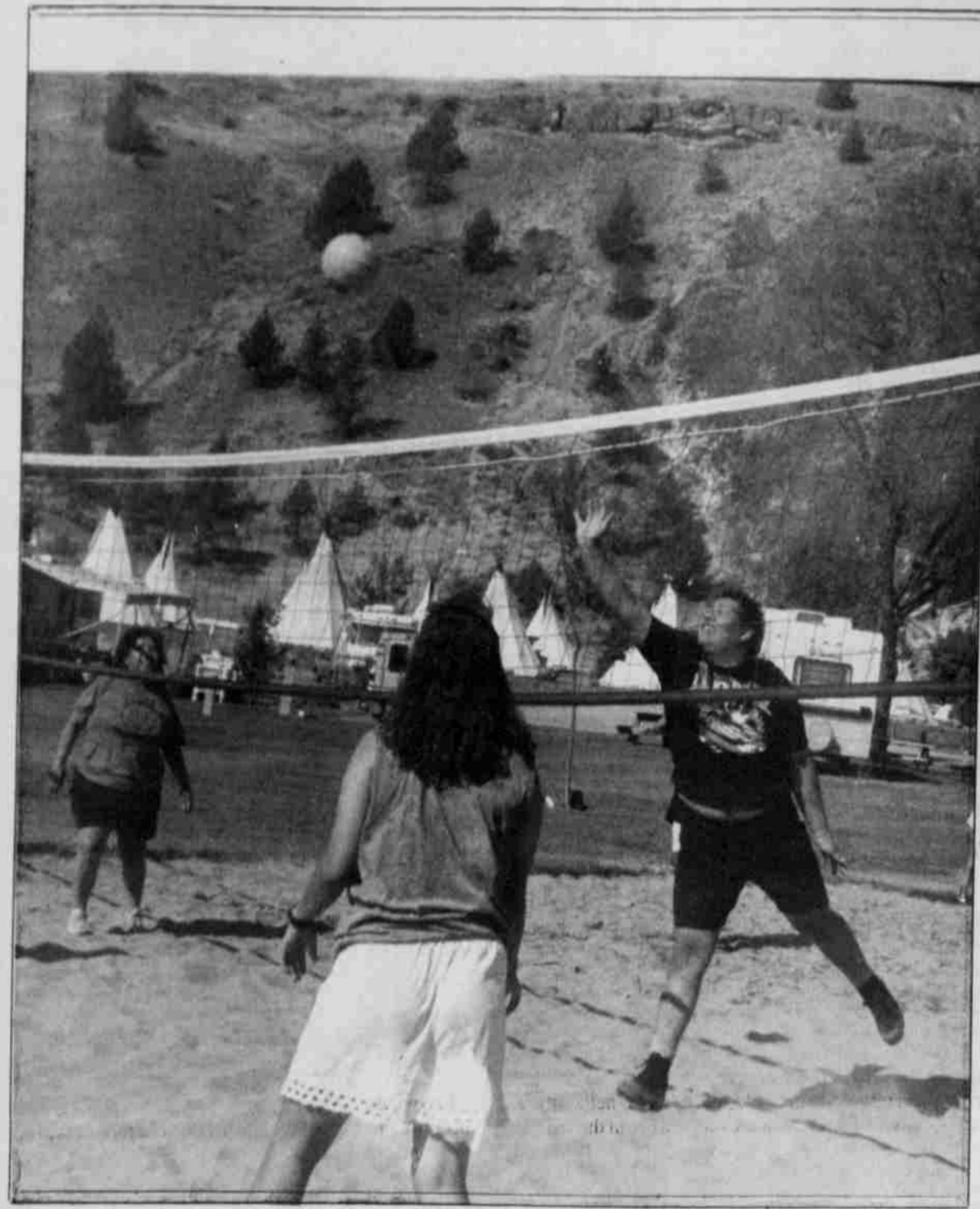
## "Animals" 10th and final tourney results
