### Please return bicycles to us

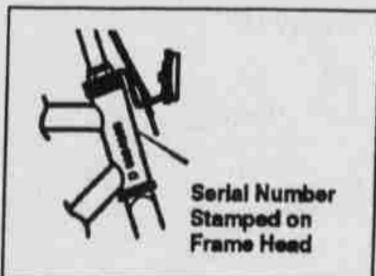
