Serious brain damage, vision problems and loss of the ability to walk can result from shaking babies. Shaking can also be very harmful to children as old as three or four years.

It can also be harmful to swing or pick up young children by their arms. The shoulder joint is very mobile. The "Ball" at the top of the upper arm bone can be twisted out of its shoulder socket. This is more likely to happen if the arm receives a sudden jolt when arms are stretched about the head. Play carefully with young children and respect their small size and growing bodies.

The kids watched at 10 minute presentation by the "Dummies" that explained the need for everyone to "Buckle up" whenever they get in a vehicle. Hatfield newest member of committee

Senator Mark O. Hatfield has become the newest member of the Senate Select Committee on Indian Affairs.

Hatfield's membership marks the second stint for Oregon's senior senator on the Select Committee, which deals with treaty rights, fishing rights, land acquisition, Indian

reservations, and other tribal-related issues. Hatfield served previously on the Committee during the 95th and 96th Congresses (1977-1980) and said he was pleased to pick up the new Republican slot which became available this year.

"Critical issues regarding self-determination of Native American tribes will be debated in the Select Committee in coming years," Hatfield said. "I look forward to helping shape those discussions to reflect the needs of Oregon's tribes."

Hatfield, a champion for Indian rights in the Senate, has overseen the restoration of all Oregon tribes whose federal recognition was terminated in the 1950's. He has supported a variety of bills aimed at assisting Oregon tribes in their quest for self-determination and has directed millions of dollars to the tribes for special programs and projects from his

position as Ranking Republican on the Senate Appropriations Committee.

"Senator Hatfield gives Oregon's tribes an important voice on the committee," said Mark Phillips, Washington representative for Oregon's Warm Springs, Grand Ronde, and Coquille Indian tribes. "The tribes are proud that he has joined the Committee because of his long affiliation with Native Americans, his knowledge of the issues, and his prestigious position in the Senate."

"Helping Oregon's tribes achieve self-sufficiency has been extremely fulfilling. As a member of the Select Committee," Hatfield added, "I look forward to even greater involvement with Indian issues both in Oregon and nationwide."

The Committee is expected to consider several key issues in the 103rd Congress.

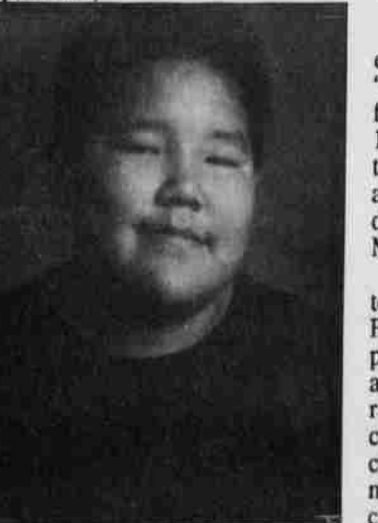

Miscellaneous excess used property will be available for sale on an "as is" basis for Tribal Members only from February 22 through March 5, 1993. The items may be viewed at the Warehouse (4209 Holliday St.) 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. Monday through Friday during the two week Tribal Member Only time frame.

Items include, but are not limited to: 4,000 gal fiberglass fuel tank, Ford F-800 garbage truck w/compactor box, mobile radio, scanner, audio visual equipment (projectors, record players, tape recorder), classroom and childcare supplies, children's chairs, office equipment, many office chairs, calculators, TVs, computer equipment, refrigerators, freezers, dishwasher, ranges, washers, dryers, and industrial curing

ovens. Some items may be added or deleted prior to the sale. All items are "as is". Known defects are annotated on the excess property list. Copies of the excess property list are available at Purchasing, the Warehouse, and tribal departments. Some items have a minimum bid.

Sealed bid offers will be accepted by the Purchasing Department until Friday, 5 p.m., March 5, 1993. You may either mail or bring your bid to Purchasing. It must be received by the deadline to be considered. The individual placing the highest bid will be selected. In case of a tie, the earliest bid will be selected. To bid, you place your bid sheet inside a

sealed envelope. Your name and item number you are bidding on must be on the outside of the sealed envelope when you submit your bid. A bid sheet inside the sealed envelope must contain: the name and address of the bidder, day time phone number, item number, description of the item, amount of bid. Bid sheets will be available at Purchasing and the Warehouse. All items are sold "as is" for cash only.

You are hereby notified that the above cited case(s), as filed in the Warm Springs Tribal Court has been scheduled for a show cause hearing at 9:00 a.m. on the 22nd day of March, 1993.

You are hereby ordered to be and appear at the Warm Springs Tribal Court at the time and date shown, to show cause why the suspended sentence of 07/09/92, should not be imposed for your failure to comply with the sentence imposed against you. This hearing, will not be a full hearing on the merits of the case; you must appear and defend against a complaint that you failed to obey the Order of the Court.

If you fail to appear as so ordered, the Tribal Court may enter a complaint for contempt of court and issue a warrant for your arrest. If you have any questions, you should seek legal assistance immediately.
