and be tested for feline leukemia for which a vaccination is also available. A second booster vaccination must be given at twelve weeks. Missing these times does not prevent the cat from being vaccinated, but the sooner the better is the rule. A yearly booster is important for continuing protection of the cat.

A rabies shot is especially impor-

tant because most rabies in domestic animals occur in cats. Rabies is caused by a virus that attacks nerve tissue. The disease develops slowly over 10 days to several months. Infected animals may withdraw and avoid contact with people and other animals or they may become aggressive. Cats should be vaccinated for rabies at 12 weeks or older and again each year.

# Prepare early to enjoy a safe and fire-free winter

What would you do if a pan of hot cooking oil caught fire? Would you:

1. Put water on it?
2. Remove the pan from the stove?
3. Throw flour on the fire?
4. Throw baking soda on the fire?
5. Cover the pan with a lid?

If you picked 5 you would be right. The rest of these methods do not work. Unfortunately they have all been tried, without a successful outcome. Lets analyze the above methods starting with #1 applying water to the fire. Applying water to a grease fire will only spread it, not put it out. Method #2 — Removing the pan from the stove. Bad idea, you run the risk of dropping it, which of course will again spread the fire to other surfaces or yourself. Method #3 — throwing flour on the fire. Don't do this either because flour will actually explode. Method #4 — throwing baking soda on the fire. That's an "iffy" situation. First, do you have enough baking soda? (It takes quite a bit). And secondly, where is it? Basically this method is the smothering type method which leads us to method #5, simply covering the pan with a lid. This is one of the easiest and most reliable ways to controlling a grease fire. An alternative way is the use of a fire extinguisher.

Remember, fire needs four ele-

ments in order to burn, they are: oxygen, a fuel source, a heat source, and chemical reaction. When you take away just one of these components your fire will die out. In the case of the grease fire, by covering the pan with a lid (can't find the lid? Use a cookie sheet or another pan etc.) You are essentially removing the oxygen or air from the fire. By smothering the fire you have just removed one of the four components needed by fire to continue burning, oxygen or air.

Everyone should have at least one portable fire extinguisher in their home. It is an excellent safety appliance for your kitchen and can be purchased at any local hardware store. The fire extinguisher should be rated ABC which means the extinguisher is capable of extinguishing three types of fires. Type A is used for simple wood/trash/paper fires. Type B is used for flammable liquids and grease and finally Type C is used for electrical fires. As you can see, this type of fire extinguisher covers a broad spectrum of fires. After you purchase your extinguisher be sure you know how to use it. Read the instructions before a fire event takes place. Don't wait until a fire breaks out that definitely won't be the time to start reading about how to use the fire extin-

guisher.

Here are a few more safety "recipes" for your survival cookbook. If you have a grease fire on top of the stove don't turn on the exhaust fan. This would just suck the fire inside the walls of your home. If the fire happens to be in the oven don't panic, turn off the heat and leave the door closed to cut off the fire's oxygen or air supply. (Remember one of the four elements required to make fire burn is oxygen or air.) Do not leave anything cooking unattended. In 1990 there were 375 fires, 19 injuries and 1 death that can be attributed to unattended items cooking on the stove.

If you have an electrical fire, turn

off the power and unplug the appliance if at all possible, use your fire extinguisher and call the fire department. According to the Oregon Fire Incident Report System, 133 fires and 2 injuries resulted from short circuits, faulty grounds and other electrical failure. One word of caution, if the fire is too large and getting out of control get yourself and other family members out of the structure. Remember things can be replaced—people can not!

Always keep your cooking appliances clean. These include stovetops, burners, ovens, broilers, toasters, and microwave ovens. Keep all combus-

tibles away from your stove or other heat source. In 1990 there were 66 fires and 3 injuries resulting from combustibles being too close to the stove. Combustible items include pot holders, cookbooks, paper towels, paper bags, and dish towels. Keep the handles of pots turned in and be sure appliance cords are up on the counter. If you're cooking or working around hot stoves, appliances or open fires don't wear loose sleeves. These can accidentally catch fire and burn you. Last but not least, when you're done with the stove or other kitchen appliance turn them off!

These simple safety precaution-

may save you, your family, and your home from a tragic event. With the holidays just around the corner and more time spent in the kitchen we all have to be more aware of kitchen fire safety.

# Spend a night out at the symphony

The Central Oregon Symphony announces six concerts in the 1993-94 season. The organization annually presents an orchestral series of three events at the Pinckney Center for the Arts at Central Oregon Community College, and moves off campus for three chamber music programs called "Music In Public Places." All events start at 7:00 p.m. on Sunday evenings.

The Central Oregon Symphony is directed by Charles Heiden, professor of music at COCC. The group is affiliated with COCC and the Central Oregon Symphony Association. March 6, the English horn soloist Jeff Stormont and principal trumpeter Jeff Briggs will be showcased in Aaron Copland's "Quiet City." Eugene mezzo-soprano Karen Linford is the soloist scheduled for April 24 in a group of opera arias by Joseph Haydn.

"Music In Public Places" opens at Cafe Paradiso at 7:00 p.m. on October 10. Baroque trio sonatas by Corelli and Haendel, scored for two violins, cello and guitar continuo, are joined with Spanish language villancicos by colonial Mexican composers. Ann Hogrefe and Patricia Sewell are the sopranos.

Saturday, October 16, a repetition of the opening program will be performed at Central Oregon District Hospital in Redmond. The series continues January 23 and May 15 in other locations to be announced.
