### CHS Program now under tribal management

To the editor,

The Contract Health Service (CHS) of Warm Springs has undergone some changes. We are no longer run by the Indian Health Service. As of October 1, 1993, the CHS Program is under Tribal management. This new change means that there will be a better relationship between the CHS Program and the local health care providers in the area.

This new change means that the Tribe will pay your medical bills. We will have the ability to "stretch" the funds that we have while making

sure that the care you receive will be of high quality. In order to accomplish this, there are several steps that we need to take:

1. It is very important that if you have an emergency health problem and you go to one of the local hospitals, that you notify the CHS Program within 72 hours in order for us to handle any changes for service.
2. If you go to any doctor or dentists off the reservation, that you get pre-authorization from your doctor or dentist here at the clinic and from the CHS office.
3. It is also important that you

bring any medical bills or any other paperwork to the CHS office as soon as you get them since we only have a certain amount of time to process them.

4. Our toll-free telephone number is: 1-800-336-7162 (This number is good from anywhere in the U.S.).

5. Please keep in mind that we are moving into the new Health and Wellness Center at the end of October.

6. Our name is also changing to "Managed Care Program."

We are very interested in hearing from you and are always willing to make changes to improve the system. Please call or visit us.
