The Museum at Warm Springs extends thanks to all artists who took part in the First Tribal Member Art Show. From opening night, the show has proven successful for both the artists and The Museum. Although a firm date has not yet been set, member artists are encouraged to make plans to take part in the Second Tribal Member Art Show next year, said Exhibits Coordinator Roxanne Casey.

The show yielded eight awards as juried by Bend artist Sue Bennett, including a judge's choose award and seven honorable mentions. In addition, eight pieces were honored with Timberline Lodge Purchase Awards. Timberline paid \$300 for each honorable mention.

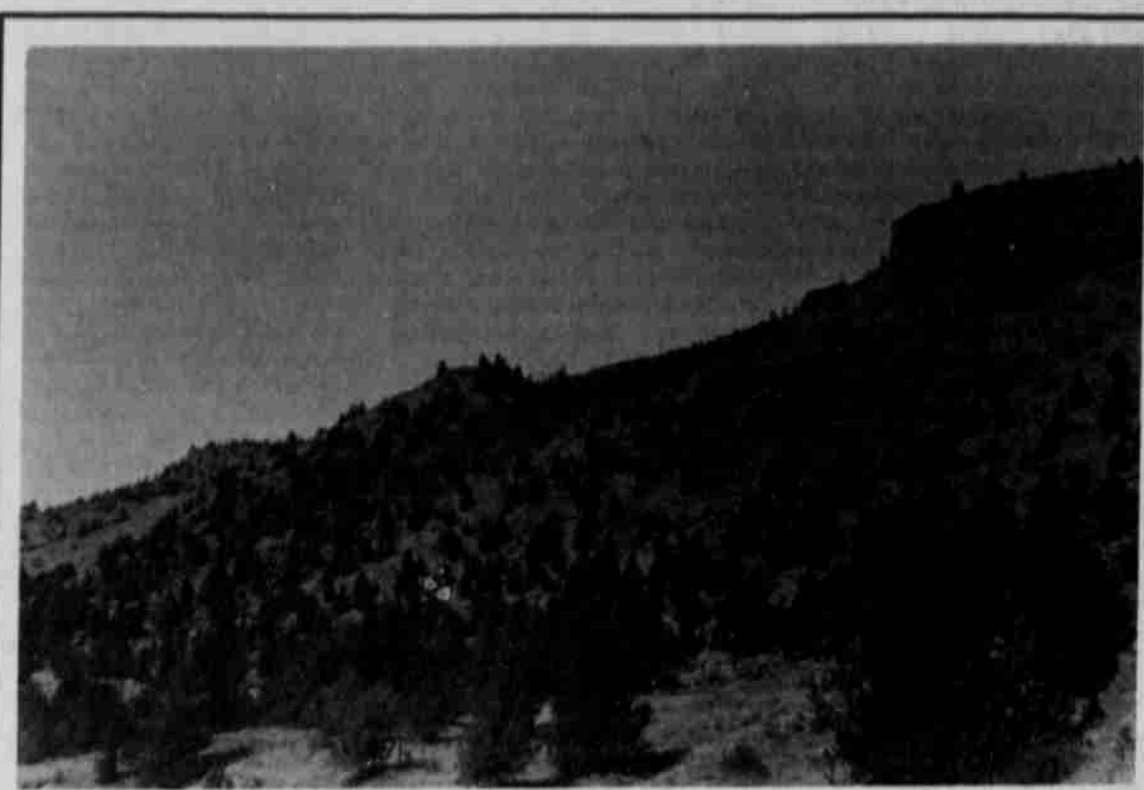
The Timberline Purchase Awards recipients were selected by Richard

L. Kohnstamm, Chairman for the Board of Timberline Lodge. Purchase awards were given only to those pieces that were for sale to the public. Timberline contributed \$5,000 to the show.

"This wonderful new museum in Warm Springs is definitely the cornerstone of vital efforts to display and thus make known to outsiders; the story of the local tribes, and by extension, the kinds of artwork with which they rightfully should be associated," Kohnstamm said. "Together I believe we can steer public awareness in the direction of holding in high regard the very unique and meaningful designs of the local and regional tribespeople."

The First Tribal Member Art Show runs through January 7, 1994 in the changing exhibit gallery at the Museum.

On Patrol

Local party ends in stabbing

On Friday, October 22, officers along with local EMS personnel responded to the Tao-shuh street area when a female called in reporting that she needed the ambulance to respond to a stabbing victim.

On arrival, a male adult identified as Melvin Scott Jr. was found to be made victim of multiple stab wounds to the arm and chest area who was then transported to Mt. View Hospital for further treatment. Naming his attacker, officers continued the investigation that led to the Oitz loop area where evidence substantiating the statement was located. Further investigation led to the arrest of the primary suspect along with (6) six other individuals who are believed to be involved with this incident. On arrival at Mt. View Hospital, another male adult, Emerson Miller was reported to have walked into the Hospital with a similar wound. Not knowing he was connected with this incident, Scott pointed out that Miller was also in attendance at the same party during the early morning hours.

Both Scott and Miller were reported to have gone through surgery at Mt. View Hospital, and an alleged weapon was also recovered believed to have caused the injuries sustained in this incident. WS Police along with the local BIA Special agent and FBI are continuing with the investigation which could lead to Federal charges being filed.

In Brief

Oct. 10-15: Several malicious mischiefs and break and enter complaints were filed with police as vandals and thieves made rounds to the Shitike Creek, West Hills, Vern Jackson Home, and Workenton street areas.

In an odd call from Mt. View Hospital, Dr. Manning called to have officers deliver a message to a local adult male requesting he report back to the hospital for observation. The wife of the subject in question was contacted.

On a complaint from an individual who was getting tired of dealing with intoxicated subjects in and around his home, officers responded to the Poosh street area where (7), seven arrests were made. Three local warrants were cleared and a female sub-

ject was charged additionally for drug violation.

A call to the Tommie street area, had officers slithering when they were asked to remove a snake that was loose in the neighborhood. An MVA was investigated near Holliday street and Upper Dry Creek road as two vehicles were involved. A local runaway report was filed.

A restraining order violation led to the arrest of a male adult in the West Hills area. On a report from the Shepherd street area, local fire personnel along with police responded to find that a bathroom fan was over heating. Following a break-in of a vehicle near the Miller Heights area, two suspects then proceeded to the Space Age Station where one or both subjects acted as a gas station attendant and proceeded to take the cash from a paying customer. Leaving the area, both suspects were identified that led to their arrests. One of the suspects was found to be operating a vehicle while intoxicated who was charged additionally for DUI.

A Hispanic male subject was arrested after a complaint was filed who later was found to be operating a motorcycle while under the influence of intoxicants. Local Prosecutor's will be looking to exclude the subject who has other pending charges before the tribal court on similar violations. Following processing of the subject in the tribal jail, he was later transported to Jefferson County on state charges of the same nature. EMS personnel were activated when they were called to the Upper Dry Creek area on a senior citizen having breathing difficulties. She was transported to Mt. View hospital for further treatment.

On a tip from a local citizen, officers responded to the Tommie Street area where it was reported that a local jail inmate who was on escape could be found. Arriving, officers covered all exits as the homeowner was confronted regarding the call. The escapee was found trying to hide in a closet. Charges are pending for aiding and abetting against the home owner.

Oct. 15-22: A 4-trax accident left a male adult in need of medical attention as EMS personnel responded to the looksh street area. On possible internal injuries, the male subject

was later transported to St., Charles Medical Center for further treatment and diagnosis. The local housing authority was made victim of a break and enter, malicious mischief. Any information leading to the arrest of the person(s) responsible will be taken by calling 553-3272.

A minor was arrested for liquor violation who was transported to jail where he was detoxed for the minimum six hour period. On a report of a prowler in the Oitz loop area, officers came up empty as no one was located. A local male adult was apprehended after he was reported intoxicated in the Walsey lane area. Officers were led up the side of the hill where the subject threatened to throw rocks at the officers if they approached him. Following conversation, the subject was talked into cooperating with local authorities.

A male adult was reported to have been assaulted the night before in the Walsey lane area, however on further investigation, he did not know who his attackers were. A call to the Foster street area ended peacefully after a domestic dispute was settled temporarily by the two parties separating for a cooling off period.

911 led officers to the Looksh street area where a fight in progress was reported. Prior to arrival, one of the parties mentioned had left the area who was later located for questioning on the incident. A domestic dispute was reported in the Deer area as officers responded. Arriving, one of the suspects locked himself in an apartment not belonging to himself with the renter left standing outside. Further assistance was given as the renter agreed to take in the male adult as long as he behaved himself. No further action was taken.

Another domestic dispute was unfounded on Oitz loop where officers responded to. A local female was picked up on local warrant; and a male adult was detoxed out of Upper Dry Creek road after being reported to police of causing a disturbance.

On a report of a runaway being hidden in the Looksh and Juniper street areas; officers were unable to locate the female after making contact with each household. An attempted break and enter was cut short as officers were called to the Oitz loop area. A UUMV report was filed

with police that led to the recovery of the vehicle described as a brown van. The driver was subsequently charged for the offense. Officers checked on smoke and sparks coming from a chimney in the Kalish street area. Local firefighters remind households to get their chimney's checked and serviced regularly.

On an extended weekend for local homeowners in the Greeley heights area, the owners returned home to find that their homes had been broken into and priceless regalia items were stolen; anyone with knowledge are encouraged to step forward.

Two subjects were removed from the Upper Dry Creek area after the homeowner called police to have them removed for being intoxicated. Following further investigation, neither party was found to be intoxicated who were escorted home.

On a silent alarm at IHS, officers responded to find Dr. Creelman the culprit of setting it off. Officers investigated a theft complaint on Bray street where it was reported that numerous video tapes were stolen. On yet another break-in; more cultural regalia and baskets were discovered missing or stolen that led to the recovery of a trunk near red lake with various items still intact. Most of the priceless items were still missing. Police encourage anyone with information leading to the suspect(s) arrest to please step forward, someone has to know something about these recent thefts. Numerous contacts around the Pacific Northwest have been contacted to be on the look out for these and other stolen items.

On a call for a subject who slashed his wrist, officers along with local EMS responded to the Miller heights area where he was later transported to Mt. View Hospital for further treatment.

Officers were saturating the WS area as a drive-by shooting was reported on Foster street. The suspect vehicle is described as a possible blue in color station wagon. On further investigation, it appeared that the instrument used was possibly a BB gun, pellet gun, or sling shot. The investigation is continuing.

A blue sedan is wanted in connection with a hit and run that occurred at the WS elementary school cafeteria. A tip led officers to the Walsey lane area where a male subject was arrested for escape. The male subject originally escaped from the IHS clinic as officers were trying to attend to two subjects at once during treatment. The female home-renter is facing charges of aiding and abetting.
