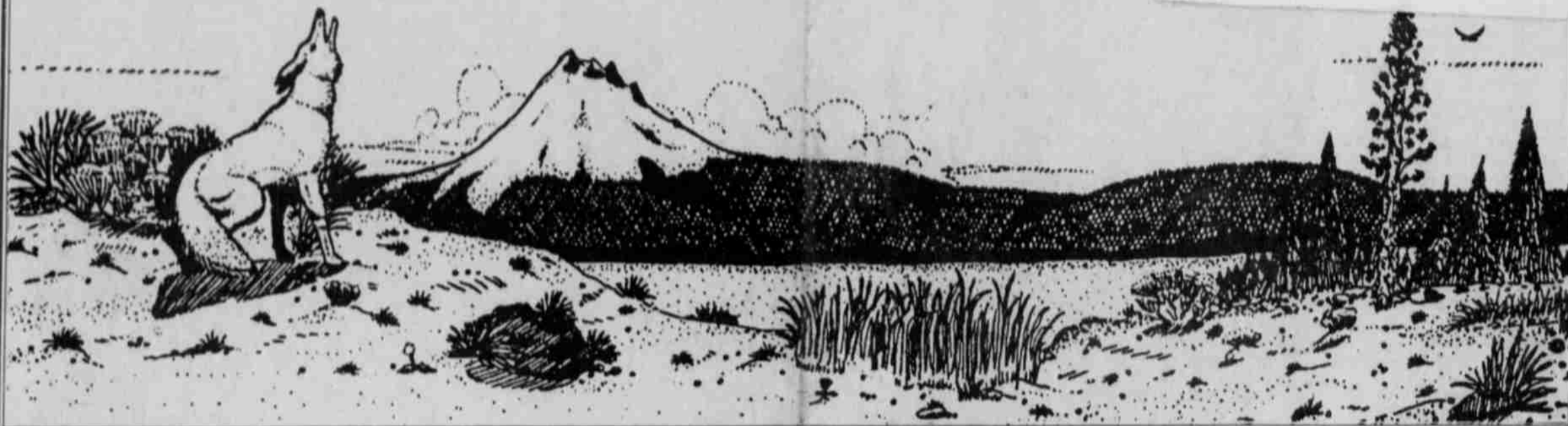

Application submitted for \$180,000 block grant

An Indian Community Development Block Grant application was submitted this week to the Department of Housing and Urban Development in Seattle. The \$180,000 request, if approved,

will help us implement a coordinated neighborhood-by-neighborhood approach to housing rehabilitation and neighborhood renovation. We need to foster healthy neighborhoods" stated Ken Smith, the CEO and Secretary-Treasurer for the Tribes.

Tribal and non-tribal resources are planned for the project, including

funds from the BIA's Housing Improvement Program. Assistance will also be requested from the IHS and other sources.

The project is planned to be carried out next spring and summer. Miller Heights is proposed as the second neighborhood project, scheduled for 1995. Elliot Heights and Miller Heights are the two oldest subdivisions in Warm Springs, starting in the 1940s after WWII.

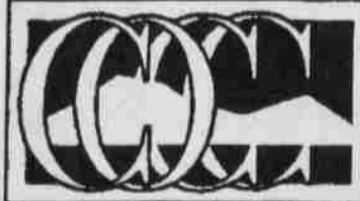
Information about the application may be obtained in the planning office at the Administration Building.

Mt. Hood advisory committee to meet

The Mount Hood Corridor Study citizen advisory committee will meet Monday, November 8, 1993 from 7 to 10 p.m. at the Mount Hood Lions Club in Welches.

Public comments will be taken but those wishing to speak are asked to limit their comments to three minutes. Also on the agenda will be committee business and presentations of safety and congestion information.

The citizens advisory committee has 13 members representing broad based interests from the community. These interests include community and business groups, environmental and preservationist groups, bicycle, trucking, transit, tourism/recreation, resort/ski industries and land use planning.

The committee's primary role will be to provide an opportunity for citizens to voice their ideas, comments and concerns. In addition, the committee will advise the Mount Hood Corridor Study team in the review of pertinent documents and various alternatives to be included in the study.
