the United States and Canada, who send the top two contestants from each event to the finals. Throughout all these ten regions this includes 5000 Indian contestants who compete in all the sanctioned rodeos during the year. So you can imagine how tough it can get to make it to the

All Indians both men and women who work hard all season long in their special events, all with the dream of making it to the INFR at the end of the year, where the worlds championships are at stake.

The six major rodeo events and the women's barrel race and breakaway roping events are featured at the INFR. All year long the cowboys and cowgirls earn and pay their own way as they travel from rodeo to rodeo. Sometimes its an endless case of traveling and not even making a cent. But with their hearts they are in there participating for their share of

the glory of winning the regional title. It takes a lot of dedication and sacrifices by all contestants who have their goals set to compete at the Indian Nationals Finals Rodeo. This is where it comes down to the point of who makes the most points to compete with the other regional repre-sentatives where the Worlds Championships are at stake.

A person can't mess around all year waiting for the finals to come around and dig up enough money to enter in the finals. He has to earn his way by building up points all season long as each region has their dues the cowboy and cowgirls have to pay before their points are compiled and to determine who has built up the most points in order for them to compete in the regional finals, before he makes it to the National Finals. It is a long hard tough road to be able to be the one who represents the region he is in. The stock is the best in the world as they are on their way to the P.R.C.A. National Finals rodeo which will be held in Las Vegas later on in the year.
