

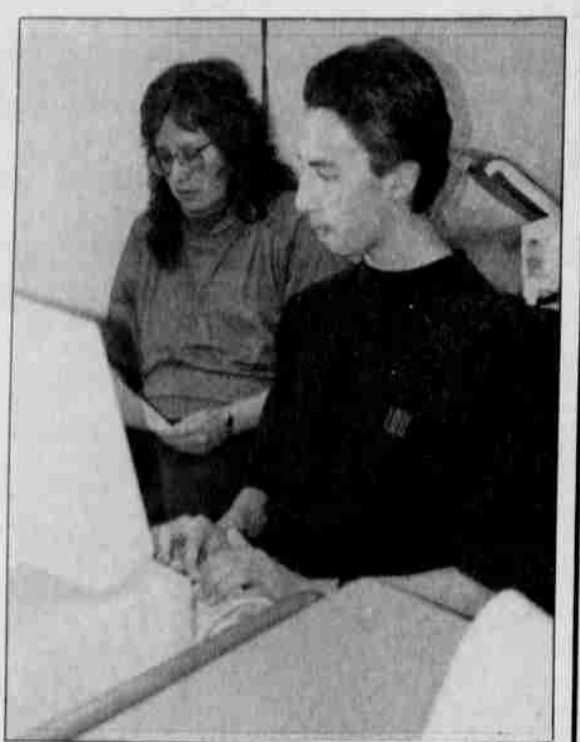
# Madras High opens doors for community visitation

## Army alumni program gains support in Northwest

The U.S. Army Recruiting Battalion — Portland is soliciting the support and cooperation of the business community in developing the Army Employer Alumni Network throughout the northwest area, according to U.S. Army spokesman Gary Stauffer.

This network of employers and U.S. Army veterans is intended to provide quality employees to the business community while providing a source of employment to Army veterans. These veterans may be recently retired; persons who have completed their two-, three- or four-year enlistment or those who have taken early releases as part of the Army's build down program.

Employers are under no obligation to hire any applicants, but are asked to enroll their company to receive resumes, free of charge, from persons interested in relocating into their area. The soldier reviews computer input from various companies in locations where he or she may want to relocate and then sends resumes to those companies that have expressed interest in employing someone with their skills.

To date, a variety of employers have enrolled in this national job

search program. Included are school districts looking for vocational training instructors, colleges, major businesses, factories, retail sales outlets and trucking companies, to name a few. There is no limitation to the type of companies who may wish to enroll. Currently, Army speakers are meeting with Chambers of Commerce, Rotary, Lions, Kiwanis and Veterans Clubs to discuss the pro-

gram and urge enrollment.

It is the Army's position that the Army Employer Alumni Network will provide employers with a quality, well-trained, drug-free work force for years to come.

The Army continues to enlist high quality young men and women into service. Historically these young people enlist to take advantage of the skill training and educational ben-

efits available and then return to civilian life to put their newly learned skills to use. It is for the purpose the Army Employer Alumni Network was originated.

An International World Celebration of Indigenous People "Gathering of Nations" is to begin April 21, 1994, at the University of New Mexico Arena "The Pit," in Albuquerque, New Mexico. There will be over \$70,000 to be awarded to contest winners. The three day event is co-sponsored by The University of New Mexico and is North America's biggest powwow. Powwow will feature the Indian Trader's Market, Miss Indian World contest and special contests. The public is invited to attend. Admission fee is \$5.00 for Friday and \$6.00 for Saturday, \$9.00 for both days, group rates available also.

Central Oregon Arts in Education is one of 12 regional programs sponsored by the Oregon Arts Commission. A non-profit 501 C3 organization, COAIE is supported by school site fees, grants from the Oregon Arts Commission, the National Endowment for the Arts, the S.S. Johnson and Oregon Community Foundations and the generous support of private businesses and individuals, including the U.S. and First Interstate Banks, Eagle Crest and Pepsico. Housed in Evergreen School in Redmond, COAIE has been in existence since the early 1980's. Originally conceived as the Poets in the Schools Program, COAIE has expanded to include all art forms. COAIE traditionally has focused on the Artist in Residency or Artist in the Schools Program. However, with changes in school needs and fiscal funding limitations, the program has expanded to include:

### TEACHER IN-SERVICE & TRAINING WORKSHOPS

Artist will work with school curriculum directors/principals to develop hands on workshops for teachers/parent group in their field of expertise. These training opportunities may be held in conjunction with a residency or held independently, lasting from one hour to several days.

### FORM INTO SCHOOL CURRICULUM-Artists

will sometimes work with teachers to integrate their art form into on-going or to create new curriculum. An example would be for a ceramic artist to include some chemistry and math into their lessons or to present a short discussion on the Chinese terra cotta figures if a class might be studying China, etc.

### VERY SPECIAL ARTS AND AT-RISK RESIDENCIES

Artists may elect to work with non-traditional classrooms and centers. The artist, is interested would receive training on working with these populations. Frequently, these populations are integrated into the traditional classroom and the artist may encounter them in the schools.

### SUMMER ARTS AND COMMUNITY ARTS CLASSES

COAIE will sponsor short term classes or performances with AIE artists. Frequent partnerships are arranged between COAIE and The Museum at Warm Springs, Parks and Recreation District, Senior Centers, COCC, the Forest Service, ESDs and At-Risk Centers. Salary, length and requirements will vary.

Applications must be postmarked by March 15, 1994.
