committee meetings.) Interviews: an accurate picture of what is happening. (example: ask the same question to several different individuals)

Review of Written Materials: a comprehensive overview of each component. Describe specific strategies used by the program to meet each Performance Standard as well as timelines and responsible persons. Review of policies, procedures, forms, etc.

Results are recorded on the SAVI form by checking YES or NO (the program is or isn't in compliance) and by commenting on the specifics of that area. Often the local written plan is adjusted to improve the programs ability to comply.

By annually reviewing our Head Start Program and including parents, staff and community in the self assessment the continued success of the program is assured.

## Health Fairs coming up

Thursday April 28th is the Head Start Pre-3 Health Fair at the Health & Wellness Center. As a service to the community, ECE and IHS are coordinating this day to allow parents/guardians of children who will be eligible for Head Start in September 1994, to have their physical done and up-date their immunizations. An up to date physical and immunization form are required for a child to enroll in Head Start. If you miss this day it will be your responsibility to take your child to the doctor for a physical and to obtain an immunization certificate.

Physicals and Immunization Day

for pre-Kindergarten children will be Thursday May 12th. A physical and immunization certificate is required for children entering the Elementary school.

The next Positive Indian Parenting Class will be "Praise in Traditional Parenting."

Praise played an important role in traditional parenting. When a girl made her first basket, it was given to an elder, usually Grandma. The elder would make a big fuss and say "You will one day be a great basket maker!"

When a young boy caught his first fish, no matter how small, it was given to an elder who cooked it, ate it and praised the child saying, "You will be a great fisherman someday." By relying on the culture strengths exhibited in the old ways, parents can begin to be positive parents through the appropriate use of praise.

One thing parents can do is increase the number of opportunities to give praise is to set up situations in which the child can please. Children can be given tasks for which the parent knows they will be able to give praise. Remember, even attempts should be praised. Praise should be as specific as possible so the child

knows what they did right.

This class will be held on Wednesday 4/27/94 from 6-8 p.m. in ECE Building "C". As always, a light meal and child care will be provided.

## Quality assurance label ensures lead-free crayons

Health officials are warning parents and day care providers that some off-brand crayons made in China could be contaminated with lead.

Following a warning issued by the Oregon Health Division, Deschutes County Health Department workers have been notifying local stores about the crayons.

"We've been talking to major retailers of crayons in the Bend area to make sure they are aware that certain crayons may contain high levels of lead even if they are labeled as nontoxic," said Laura Brown, a registered nurse with the Health Department.

Crayons may be assumed to be lead-free if their box has the assurance label "ASTM D-4236."

"Most brand names-Crayola, Prang, Rose Art, Sargeant-have that

assurance number right on the box and are safe," said Brown. "We're talking mostly about off-brand crayons, the kinds most likely found in discount stores."

Brown said some stores in Central Oregon despite warnings from county health department officials, continue to carry crayons that don't have the assurance number and could be contaminated with lead.

"There is no law that says these crayons must be pulled from the shelf, so its up to the parents to be vigilant when they purchase them," she said.

The health division released a statement last week that said a box of standard-size crayons purchased in Oregon recently were found to contain lead at levels of at least 250 parts per million.

"The box for these crayons is labeled 'Made in China' and 'nontoxic' but does not have the ASTM

D-4236 assurance," said Ken Kauffman, an environmental specialist with the health division.

Oregon's investigation was spurred by findings in Arizona, where a box of jumbo crayons made in China was found to contain 800 parts per million lead.

"Children's toys, especially the kind that could be eaten by a child, should be zero lead levels," said Kauffman. "There is no 'acceptable' level for lead contamination."

If parents or other persons who supervise children suspect that a youngster has been chewing a crayon that might be toxic, they should make an appointment to have the child tested for lead poisoning at their county health department.

The tests, which involve the drawing of blood from the child, are free in Deschutes County because the county is involved in a pilot

program for lead testing. There is a charge in Crook and Jefferson counties.

"It's important that parents with concerns about their child chewing on crayons have their child's lead-level tested," said Brown. "Lead-poisoning symptoms will build up over time, and often go unnoticed because the signs aren't that dramatic."

Lead ingestion causes injury to the brain and nervous system, and long-term effects include learning disabilities, decreased growth, hyperactivity and impaired hearing. If caught early enough, the effects can be limited by eliminating the source of lead. In severe cases, the poisoning is treated with medication.

Brown said that no cases of lead poisoning have been reported in Oregon from lead-contaminated crayons. However, in 1993 the health division received reports of 139 children with elevated bloodlead levels. Most of these were traced to ingestion of lead-paint particles from old homes, Kauffman said.

"It's unlikely that children using contaminated crayons only for coloring are at risk for elevated lead," Brown added. "But we want to remind parents and others who supervise children to take special care to see that children don't put any crayons in their mouths."

Alvin J. Smith

Alvin Johnny Smith, an enrolled member of the Warm Springs Confederated Tribes died April 3, 1994 at his home in Warm Springs, OR due to heart failure. Smith was 82 years old. He was born in the family home along the Deschutes River to Fred and Lucy (McCorkle) Smith on March 16, 1912 in Warm Springs.

He attended public school in Warm Springs. His special interests were fishing and bowling. Alvin was one of the last men to be a traditional dip net fisherman at Celilo Falls before the construction of The Dalles Dam.

He had several jobs before entering the Army on March 11, 1942. He served in North Africa and Italy in the 835th Aviation Engineer Battalion. His unit built air strips in North Africa and Italy. He was honorably discharged November 5, 1945 at Ft. Lewis, Washington having earned the rank of Staff Sgt.

Smith married Lillian Starr on March 26, 1946 at Warm Springs. When he returned from the service he worked in the B.I.A. Roads Department. He eventually became the foreman of the Maintenance crew.

He received a Department of the Interior Citation for improving the Kahneeta road. After 40 years of service with Roads Department he retired, then went to serve on two Tribal Council Committees, the Land Use & Planning and the Water Board committee.

He was a member of the Warm Springs Presbyterian Church and the V.F.W., which he was one of the

original founders and the first commander. He helped establish the Elliott Palmer Post #4217 in 1952.

He is survived by son Wayne Smith of Bend, OR and daughter Arlene Smith-Graham of Warm Springs. Two grandchildren Russell and Craig Graham. Two brothers Woodrow and Grant Smith and one sister Edna Sanders all of Warm Springs. Also are many cousins, nieces and nephews. Preceded in death are his wife Lillian in 1993, daughter Sharon Smith, brothers: Henry 1906; Harvey 1910, Milan 1992 and sisters: Ruby Coone 1983; Relda Smith 1915, LeMinnie Smith 1939 and Wilma Smith 1931 and parents Lucy and Fred Smith.

All Denominational Prayer Services were held on Wednesday, April 6, 1994 at 7:00 p.m. at Bel-Air Colonial Funeral Home in Madras, OR. Mr. Smith laid in state overnight at the Warm Springs Presbyterian Church. Funeral services were on Thursday, April 7, 1994 at 11 a.m. at the Presbyterian Church with Reverend Rick Ribeiro and Reverend Allen Elston officiating. Full military services were held at the burial site at the Agency Cemetery following the funeral service.
