

Enforcement officer needed

Position: Fisheries Enforcement Officer (3 positions)
Salary: Starting \$22,482.50 per year

Closing: June 30, 1994

Duties: Will be stationed in Hood River, Oregon. Fisheries officers are directly responsible for carrying out all enforcement and prevention patrols, by vehicle, foot and boat patrols, on the mainstem Columbia River and its environs. The purpose and emphasis of such patrols shall be dictated by Commission policy, tribal policy and the contractual obligations of the Fisheries Enforcement Program and direction from patrol supervisors.

Supervision received: Fisheries officers work under the direct supervision of the patrol sergeant and indirect supervision of the Lieutenant.

Desired Qualifications:

1. BPST certified or certifiable (in the state of Oregon) with knowledge and experience of general enforcement duties and techniques. Knowledge of, or ability to learn, tribal fishing rights and enforcement codes.
2. Ability to become familiar with and use equipment and patrol techniques for effective fisheries enforcement in the mainstem Columbia River.
3. Ability to work well as a team member with individuals from other Tribal enforcement agencies and non-

Indian enforcement agencies.

4. Possess self-initiative and ability to function with minimal direct supervision utilizing self-initiative in conducting productive, protective and enforcement patrols.

5. Possess tact and good communication skills, both verbally and written.

6. Maintain physical standards required of an enforcement officer for purposes of health, safety, agility and professional appearance.

7. Be willing to and able to work long hours and rotating shifts as necessary to provide coverage related to the seasonal aspects of fisheries enforcement.

Treatment of head lice must be thorough

It seems that Head Lice have never really left us this year. With the advent of spring, baseball and T-ball, we are seeing another epidemic of head lice. With this information in mind it would be wise to check everyone's hair 2-3 times per week to make sure no crumblers have set up housekeeping. It is much easier to remove 1 or 2 nits from the hair than sit down and spend 1 or 2 hours doing the same thing.

There are some things that can be done to prevent the spread of head lice. Have the baseball players NOT trade their caps with each other and always wear their baseball caps under their batting helmets. Headbands, barrettes, scarfs, combs, brushes, and hair ribbons shouldn't be traded either.

Should the little critters set up housekeeping the following things should be done:

1. Stop by the clinic pharmacy and pick up a bottle of Nix Cream Rinse. One bottle can generally do 2 heads unless the hair is very thick or long. Use the rinse as directed. The Nix will kill the head lice (bugs) and nits (eggs) for up to 14 days, but it is not always 100% effective.
2. Nits need to be plucked from each individual hair shaft and this job may take several hours for a severe infestation. It is easier to check the heads 2-3 times per week to catch a beginning problem, rather than spending 2-3 hours picking nits if it is a severe case. Generally nits are found within 1/4 inch of the scalp as they need the body heat to survive. They are most often found at the crown of the head, around the ears and nape of the neck and along the front brown line. A nit comb works for some nits, but they are glued to

the hair shaft and you may need to use your fingernails to get them all. Using white vinegar as a hair rinse after using the Nix helps to loosen the nits too.

3. Cleaning the house; all towels used before and during the Nix application need to be laundered in hot water before being used again. The same thing for all bed linens. All combs, brushes, barrettes, ribbons, scarfs and hats need to be washed in soapy water and rinsed. All hair should be removed from the comb and brushes before they are cleaned. Any coverings on the furniture like blankets or sheets need to be laundered also. The furniture, floors and rugs need to be vacuumed. For

stuffed toys, blankets and articles not easily washed, seal them in a large plastic garbage sack and set them in the sun or the freezer for at least 12 hours.

4. Sometimes even after all your hard work, the head lice reappear, as they are easily transmitted from head to head. Teach your children to not loan or borrow hair brushes, hats, barrettes and the like. Check your children's heads frequently and check the heads of children who are overnight guests.

I don't like to wait such long periods of time, what can I do?

What is an appointment for?

PAP smears, follow-ups, physicals, school physicals, chronic illness (diabetes, arthritis), consults, cast care, referrals, lab results.

What can be done at a scheduled nursing appointment?

Gold shot, Depo Provera, blood pressure check, weight check, allergy shot, dressing changes, pregnancy test, pre-physical labs, throat cultures, suture removals.

What is considered a "walk-in"?

Emergencies, trauma, sports

injury, chest pain, earache, abdominal pain, breathing problems, etc.

What is a "same day appointment"?

Nurse triages you on a walk-in basis. You may be asked to return at appointed time later in the day to decrease your visiting time.

When does my child need immunizations?

Schedule through Well Child (x4130) for 2, 4, 6, 12, 15, 18 month check-ups.

What number do I call to ask a nurse questions?

Can I talk to a doctor directly?

You will speak to a nurse first, and a message will be taken for the provider.

How do I get a work release?

Provider exam is required prior to work release being issued. Please schedule an appointment.

To: Daniel Knight

You are hereby notified: That the above cited case(s), as filed in the Warm Springs Tribal Court, has been scheduled for trial/hearing at 10 a.m. on the 5th day of July, 1994.

You are hereby ordered: To be and appear at the Warm Springs Tribal Court at the time and date shown to defend against the charge(s). You may be represented by yourself, by an attorney, or by a spokesman, at your own expense. You may bring

any documents you believe are relevant to this cause, and you may bring witnesses to testify on your behalf. You may request the Court to subpoena your witnesses, however, you must submit your list of witnesses no later than two weeks prior to trial; failure to do so will not be considered sufficient reason to postpone the trial. If you have any questions, you should seek legal advice immediately.

If you fail to appear as so ordered, the tribal court may enter a complaint for contempt of court and issue a warrant for your arrest.

Sixty-two year old Betty Lou Lucio died May 25, 1994 at St. Charles Medical Center in Bend due to a heart attack. Lucio is an enrolled member of the Confederated Tribes of Warm Springs. She was born June 8, 1931 to Ralph and Dorothy (Simtustus) George in Tygh Valley, Oregon. She grew up in Warm Springs and attended schools there.

She married Frank Lucio on January 30, 1971 in Culver City, Nevada. She lived in California for a number of years before returning to Warm Springs in 1973. She taught Sahaptin (Indian Language) for many years and helped to compose the Sahaptin Dictionary (The first Native Language Dictionary). She also worked for the past eleven years on the Accessions Committee purchasing and appraising artifacts for the Museum at Warm Springs.

A dressing ceremony was held Thursday, May 26 at 2 p.m. at Bel-Air Colonial Funeral Home in Madras. Following the dressing

Mass of Christian Burial was celebrated at Blessed Kateri Tekekwitha (the Warm Springs Catholic Church). Traditional overnight services followed at the Simnasho Longhouse. Caroline Tohet officiated the dressing, Rev. Todd Unger officiated the Mass, and Pierson Mitchell officiated the overnight services. Final Disposition was held at sunrise Friday, May 27, at Red Lake Cemetery in Warm Springs.

Lucio is survived by her husband; Frank Lucio, her children; Wanda Holum, LaLovi Jackson, Inman Casey Jackson, Esther D. Lucio, the grandchildren she raised; Betty Lou George, and Eva Irene George and numerous other grandchildren, nieces and nephews. She is also survived by her adoptive mother; Nettie Sawaway.

She was preceded in death by her parents, her children; Gregory Jackson in 1984, Ralph Lucio in 1973, her brothers; Cyril George in 1929, Johnny George in 1962, and Chester VanPelt in 1976. Also her sisters; Christine George in 1932 and Lasy George in 1934.

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
