Gambling will destroy our people, our community. Vote no on big time gambling. If you, choose to associate with whores, pimps, thieves, crooks, drug dealers, etc...go to Reno or Las Vegas ... why bring this sick business to Warm Springs?! We don't need gambling.

We Indian people must protect ourselves. Is it so hard to accept the reality that nobody cares about our Indian children's lives except our own Indian people... Other people take care of their own & I think its time we take care of our own.

Use your voting power to vote no

to big time gambling. Let's stop & think about the long term effects. Look behind the dollar signs as our grandmother & grandfathers did for

Thank you for taking the time to read my thoughts.

I'll be the first to admit that I have made a lot of mistakes in my life. This doesn't stop me from caring & loving our people & community.

Gambling is an evil, wicked way to live. We don't need to bring this evil, on a big time basis, to our community of Warm Springs.

Vote no on gambling, you will never regret it.

Enjoy the holidays, take care of our children, elders, our family. We are all people ... count our blessings. I care for our people & commu-

nity.
