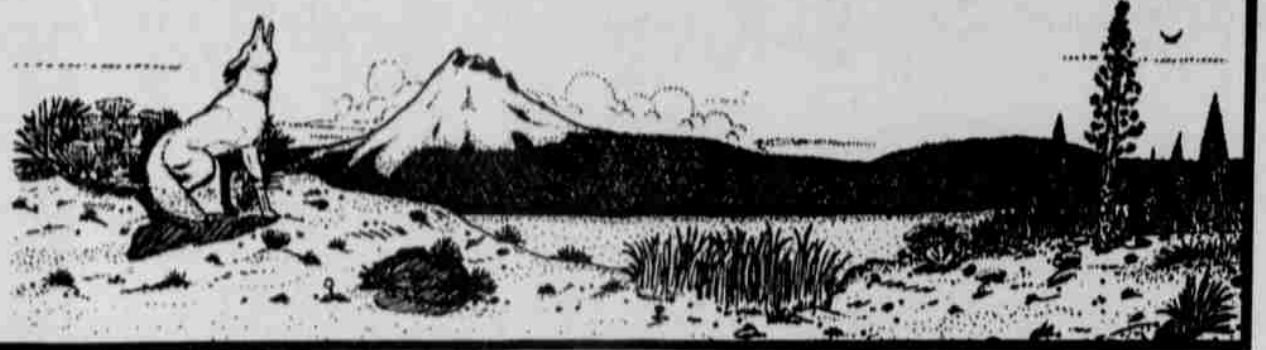


E Coosh EEWA: The way it is

The big iron hooks clanging away behind the skidder, power saws buzzing all around, logging trucks backing under the loader and men yelling at one another.

A person can look up those steep hill sides and see the remains of those old skid trails and the old landing sites where there used to be wall of logs decked on each side of the road. 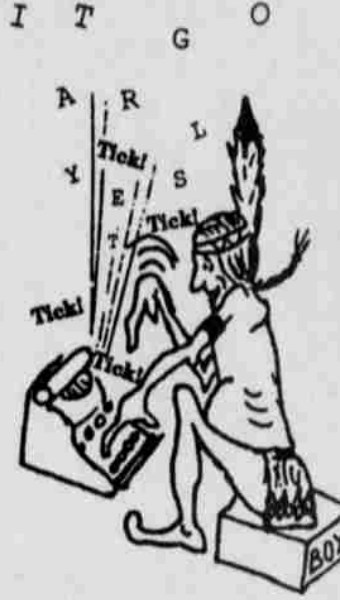
