Air Life helps save lives in Central Oregon

As Air Life of Oregon begins its 11 years, its director, Vern Bartley, can hardly believe the region's acceptance and support of a quality air ambulance service.

"We've flown nearly 4,000 patients during our tenure, our membership program enjoys the strength of over 14,000 household and business members and we're building a new hangar/office facility," Bartley says. "But most importantly, in the ten-plus years we've flown, we've never had an accident or an incident. Flying safe has always been our goal."

Back in 1985, when Air Life be-

gan, all "expert" signs pointed to failure; it was said that an air ambulance service would not be cost effective over such a sparsely populated yet large geographical area. But studies indicated that people living east of the Cascades faced a two-and-a-half times greater chance of dying in an accident than those living west of the mountains. The main reason had to do with patient transportation times; thus, Air Life was born.

The need is apparent; in just over 10 years, Air Life has logged over 7,000 hours of flight time. This trans-

lates into over a million miles flown—or the equivalent of 39 times around the earth.

In addition to its life-saving missions aboard the Bell 222 helicopter and Cessna fixed-wing aircraft, Air Life contributes to community education as well. Child car seat safety clinics have been extremely successful in various communities, and the flight team also takes time to train groups in preparing patients for air transport.

"Air Life enjoys its success because of so many supporting agencies and concerned citizens," Bartley says. "For example, local ground ambulance crews, paramedics, fire departments and first responders provide the necessary care to people facing illness or accidents, prior to Air Life's arrival. Also, they help us secure a safe landing zone; without their cooperation and teamwork, we couldn't function."

Additionally, over 100 Air Life volunteers donate their time and talents in outlying areas. Within the 70,000 square-mile service area, volunteers provide necessary information and act as goodwill ambassadors for the service.

"Air Life will continue to give back to the community in 1996 via its educational programs and other special projects," Bartley says. "This is a community effort-type program, and we so appreciate the public's support."
