

## Local elder becomes tribal member

Hazel Queahpama Tewee and her guardians Willard and La Kaigh Tewee wish to thank Mr. Mickey

Brunoe, Chairman of the Tribal Council, and all the members on the Tribal Council for unanimously accepting Hazel Queahpama Tewee as

a member of the Warm Springs Tribe. Hazel Queahpama Tewee, age 89, has tried ever since 1948 to become a Warm Springs Tribal member. Both of her grandfathers Chief Patahanashat Queahpama and Chief Simtustus were Warm Springs tribal members as were her mother Minnie Simtustus and father Frank Queahpama Sr. All were born and buried on the reservation. But Hazel, whose Indian name is Pasali, after her great, great-grandmother, was born on the Yakama reservation when her mother and father were at White Swan. Her parents were encouraged by Olney relatives over there to register Hazel into the Yakama Tribe, even though she is 15/16 Wyam (Warm Springs Tribe) and 1/16 Umatilla. At the age of six, Hazel and her parents moved back to Warm Springs onto the Simtustus home site of her grandfather where she has lived ever since.

Most of her adult life, Hazel wanted to become a member of the Warm Springs Tribe to be joined with her relatives. Now, with the help of Lenora Starr of Vital Statistics and Tribal Council, she has finally been able to attain her goal. One of our oldest elders born December 3, 1906 has become one of the Warm Springs newest members in January 1996.

A good beginning for the year 1996 for Pasali and truly a time of celebration!

### FAVORITE CEREAL MIX

### LOOKING FOR CALCIUM?

When most people think of calcium-rich foods, their thoughts normally turn to milk, cheese and yogurt. Dairy products are great sources of this mineral but other calcium containing foods should not be overlooked! Green, leafy vegetables: broccoli, spinach, kale, turnip and collard greens. Beans: Both black and navy beans are rich sources of calcium. Seafood: Shrimp and sardines with bones. Calcium-enriched foods: Breads and juices are now available with calcium added to them. Supplements are also available to add calcium to the diet. Remember yogurt is approved for snacks only and is allowable as a meal alternate.

### EXPLORING ART

#### EASY-MIX GLUE

You'll need:

- 1 cup liquid starch
- Liquid Soap
- Baby powder/talcum powder
- Liquid tempera paint (optional)

#### TO MAKE:

1. Pour the liquid starch in a large bowl.
2. Slowly stir in a little liquid soap and baby powder/talcum powder until you have a smooth glue-like consistency.
3. If you want colored glue, pour a little tempera paint into the mixture, and stir until it is thoroughly mixed. Add more paint if the children would like to darker. Repeat the process for different colors of glue.
4. Pour each color of glue into a squeeze bottle.

## Artists receive WESTAF awards

The Western States Arts Federation (WESTAF) announced today that five traditional fold artists in the West are recipients of technical assistance and funding awards that will help them improve their abilities to market themselves. The awards were made possible through a grant from the National Endowment for the Arts Fold and Traditional Arts Program.

The recipients are Amauta, a Latin-American musical group from Law Vegas; Rebecca Etukeok, a Tlingit drum maker from near Fairbanks; Max Godfrey, a cowboy rawhide braider and poet from Riverside, Utah; Pat Courtney Gold, a Wasco Indian basket maker from

Scappoose and Jeronimo Lozano, a Peruvian retablo maker from Salt Lake City.

Each of the five recipients will work closely with a consultant who will help them evaluate their promotional needs, then they will receive \$400 to help produce promotional materials.

"We are pleased to be able to help traditional artists compete in the marketplace through these awards. We hope that through this assistance more community-based fold artists will be able to share their work with the world," said Elaine Thatcher, WESTAF Folk Arts Program Director.

Preceding her in death are husband Floyd Miller, died 1973; brothers Atkins and Thodore Frank, and William Patt, sisters Nora Frank and Minnie Patt, children Miles, Myra and Larry Miller and grandson Jaime Miller who died in 1995.
