Classes offered by COCC

COCC is offering these classes, American Cinema and Native Americans (Hum 242). This course will focus on the portrayals of Indians in American Cinema and popular culture, with emphasis on cultural misconceptions and stereotypes. Students will examine how cinema reflects and creates both political realities and false assumptions. Feature topics include: the class of world views, the belief in "manifest destiny", myths of the "vanishing Indian", and the romanticizing of Indian ecology and spirituality. Attention will also be given to studying emerging patterns in portrayal of Indians, as well as contemporary collaborative, and Indian made films.

Instructor is Kevin Dye. Class starts on April 2, 1996 from 6 to 9 p.m. at the Education Center top floor. Cost: Tuition \$120 Books \$40.

Special Topics in Business Communication (WR 199)

This class is open to all Tribal employee's, the course combines work in basic writing with an intro-

duction to prevailing practices in written and oral business communication. Help with writing mechanics, spelling, and grammar will be incorporated into the course. Students will learn about basic communication processes and compose finished drafts of memos, letters and reports. Students will be encouraged to use this course to prepare business materials they can use on their jobs. This is not a duplication of WR 121 and will be transferable as an elective course in most schools.

This is the final component of the Employee Development Program that began the Fall of 94. These classes are to help individuals improve their professional skills or to gain new ones. The Instructors are Lowell Lamberton and Maggie Triplett. The course starts April 2, 1996 from 1 to 4 p.m. at the Education Center top floor. Cost: Tuition \$188, Book \$49.

In 1995, 2,652 drug tests were administered at a cost of \$75,582. Of those tests, 196 were positive. Of the 196 tests, 126 were pre-employment, 51 were random, 16 were for cause and three were monitor tests for those on last chance agreements. Overall random testing for reservation worksites in 1995 was 6.2 percent while the tribal government had a 3.1 percent positive rate. Rodgers comments that the "program has been successful. It isn't one of those programs that has an end, it is ongoing monitoring. This is a proactive approach to the situation." The Confederated Tribes and other tribal

enterprises were among the first corporations in the state to initiate drug testing among employees.

Rodgers adds that in 1989, "we had one positive test for every 7.5 employees. In 1995, we had one positive test for every 13 employees....the program has been very successful."

Rodgers says that only pre-employment and monitoring testing is being conducted during the next couple of months while EAP undergoes transition. Random testing will return once it has been determined the actual direction of the program.

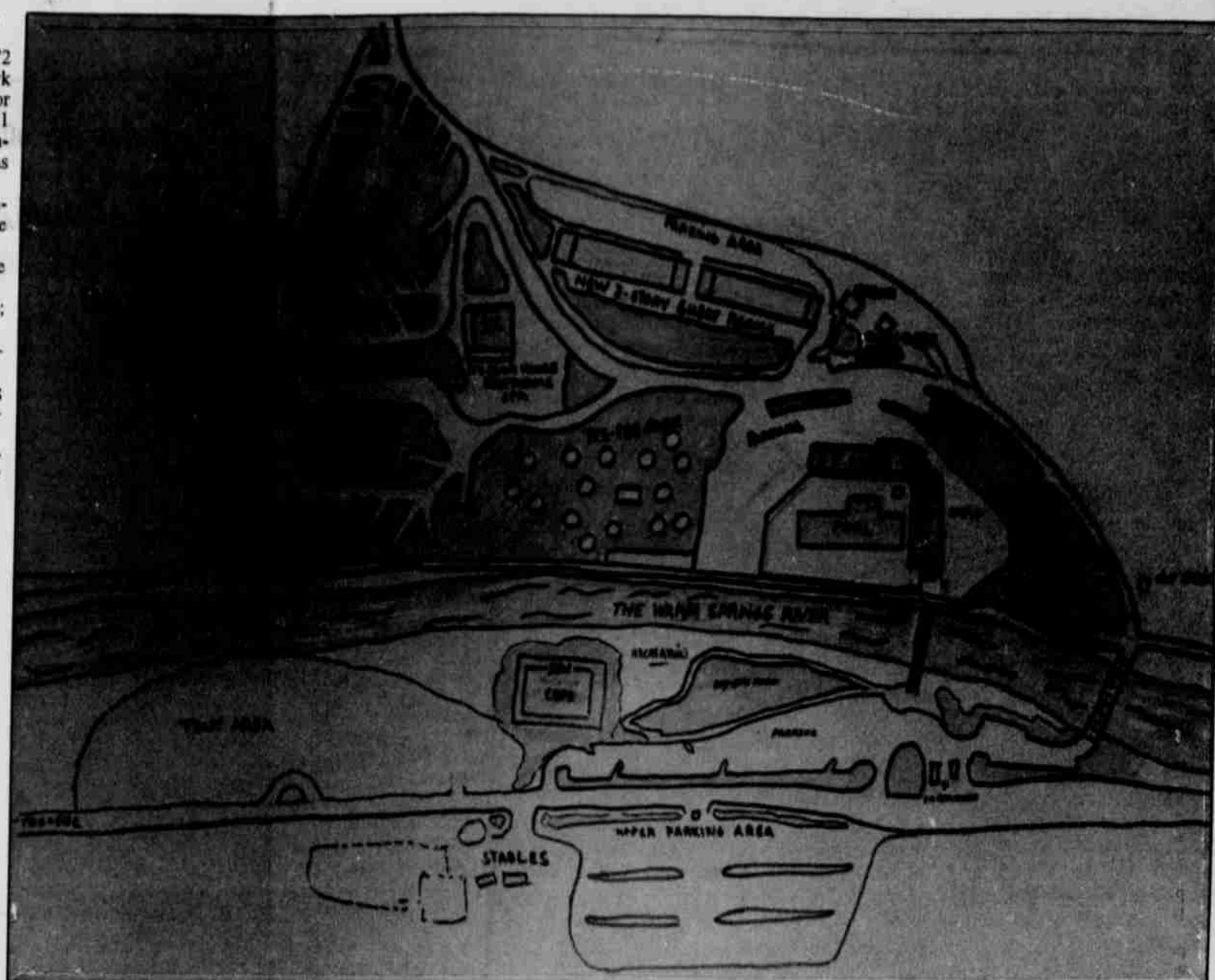
