### Managing Olympic boxing team keeps Smith busy

The USA Olympic boxing team was in Bend training from May 7 to 15 at which time they traveled to Portland for a bout with Germany on May 17.

Managing the 1996 USA Olympic boxing team is tribal member Gerald Smith. As manger Smith is responsible for arranging transportation, uniforms, housing, meals, event tickets for family members, attending technical meetings and assuring that all participants have proper accreditation. Smith must also arrive at boxing sites one day before the team arrives and wait until the last athlete leaves the site. Gerald is very pleased and excited to be chosen team leader of USA Olympic boxing team. Smith feels the most important part of his job is to make sure everything dealing with the administrative part was done, so boxers can "concentrate on boxing and the coaches can concentrate on teaching."

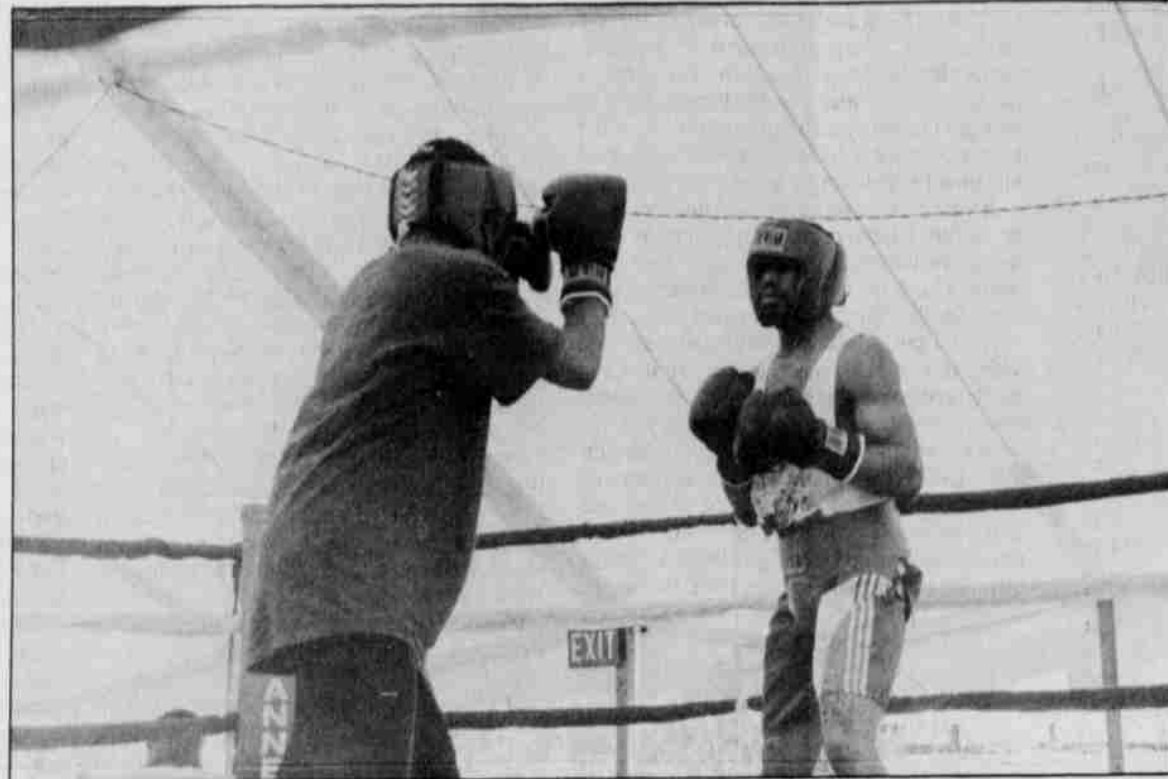
Gerald started boxing when he was 9 and continued until age 12. He took a five-years respite from the sport and started back into boxing when he was 19 while attending Portland State University. Smith boxed under the tutelage of Dick Wagner (who twice fought Floyd Patterson). Also at that time Smith got his first experience at managing boxers and found he enjoyed it.

From 1986 to 1992, Gerald was president of the USA Boxing Association of Oregon. In 1994 Gerald was selected to be team manager for the John Hancock 1995 Pan American trials held in Portland. At the annual USA Boxing Inc. meeting held in San Jose, California, it was announced that Smith was selected as the 1996 Olympic Team Manager for the Olympics held in Atlanta GA, July 20 to August 4 1996.

As a boxing team manager, ex-president of the USA Boxing Association, Gerald has traveled to many parts of the world and has met many famous amateur and professional boxers. In 1990 he coached the USA team that went to Halifax, Nova Scotia for the USA vs Canada duel match. In 1992 he went to Warsaw for the USA vs Poland/Ireland duel. On January 30 through February

20,1995 he went to the Cordova Cardin Tournament in Metanzas Cuba, as team manager for the USA. Gerald admits "I love everything about my involvement in boxing, from the conditioning, metal preparation, philosophy, up to the competitions. A boxer does not have to be a world champion to make it all worthwhile. Back in 1992 my goal was to work in an administrative position at the 1996 Olympics. My dream came true sooner than I thought. What started out as away to repay boxing fourteen years ago and seeing what I have accomplished, makes me feel great."

Gerald said one of the best compliments he recieved was in 1990, at the Goodwill Games, when USA coach Rosavell Sanders said that Gerald had "everything taken care of." Gerald also had a d compliments from this year's Olympic staff. USA Coach Al Mitchell stated

that Gerald "was a great asset to the Olympic team and takes alot of pressure away from the coaches and boxers." A trainer of the USA team

said the coaching staff has one goal: To have the boxers ready for the Olympics. "Gerald spearheads that effort by being the team leader."

USA team coach Tom Mustin of Tacoma stated that he has known Gerald since 1982 when he used to bring teams to Warm Springs. "Gerald is doing a nice job managing

plus doing alot of other duties." Alternate for the USA boxing team Ronald Simms said Gerald "was very dedicated and hard working, plus a pleasure to work with."

When asked how the Olympic team would do, Gerald boasted about the team's abilities. "They will surprise many people because of their youth".

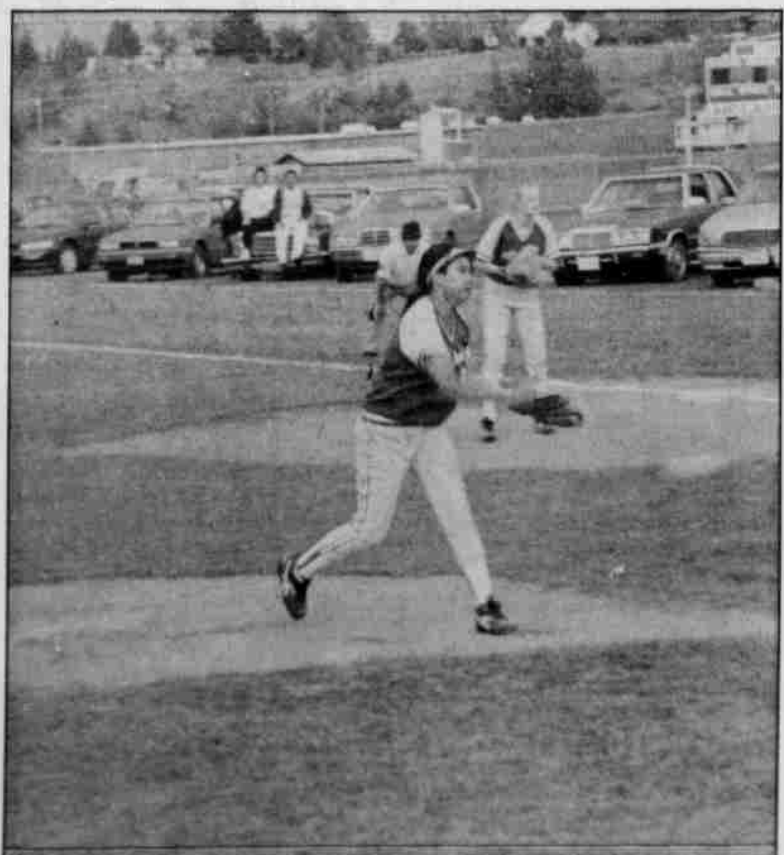
### "Best" MHS softball team shooting for state playoffs
