New pro heads up Kah-Nee-Ta golf course



Hawaiian native Joe Rauschenburg is new Kah-Nee-Ta golf pro.

Hawaiian native, Joe Rauschenburg, is the new golf pro at Kah-Nee-Ta Resort. Joe is 48-years-old, married and the father of five children.

Rauschenburg has twenty years service with the Marines. While in the Marines, Joe did two tours in Vietnam, with a sniper platoon. After Vietnam, Rauschenburg got involved in sports, such as basketball,

boxing, volleyball and football. He also was an athletic director, an aquatic and recreation director. During the last part of his tour Joe was a hand-to hand-combat instructor.

From 1988 to 1990, Rauschenburg worked with the state of Oregon as an employees' and veterans' representative. He also was a representative for the disabled for the state of Oregon

and director for the homeless in Lane County.

In 1990, he became a first assistant at Shadow Country Club, in Eugene, for a year-and-a-half then became head golf pro for Eugene Municipal golf course. It was just a few weeks ago that Rauschenburg took the golf pro job at Kah-Nee-Ta. Joe stated, "I feel comfortable working here. The staff and management are great." He also added, "I hope to see more tribal members get involved in golf."

"Course conditions are excellent," Ron Gerhart, shop assistant stated. Evidence of "flood damage is non-existent."

Following are the prices for golfing at Kah-Nee-Ta. For nine holes, \$9 and for 18 holes price is \$15, while season passes are \$425 dollars after January 15. The price is \$400 if the season pass is purchased before the middle of January.
