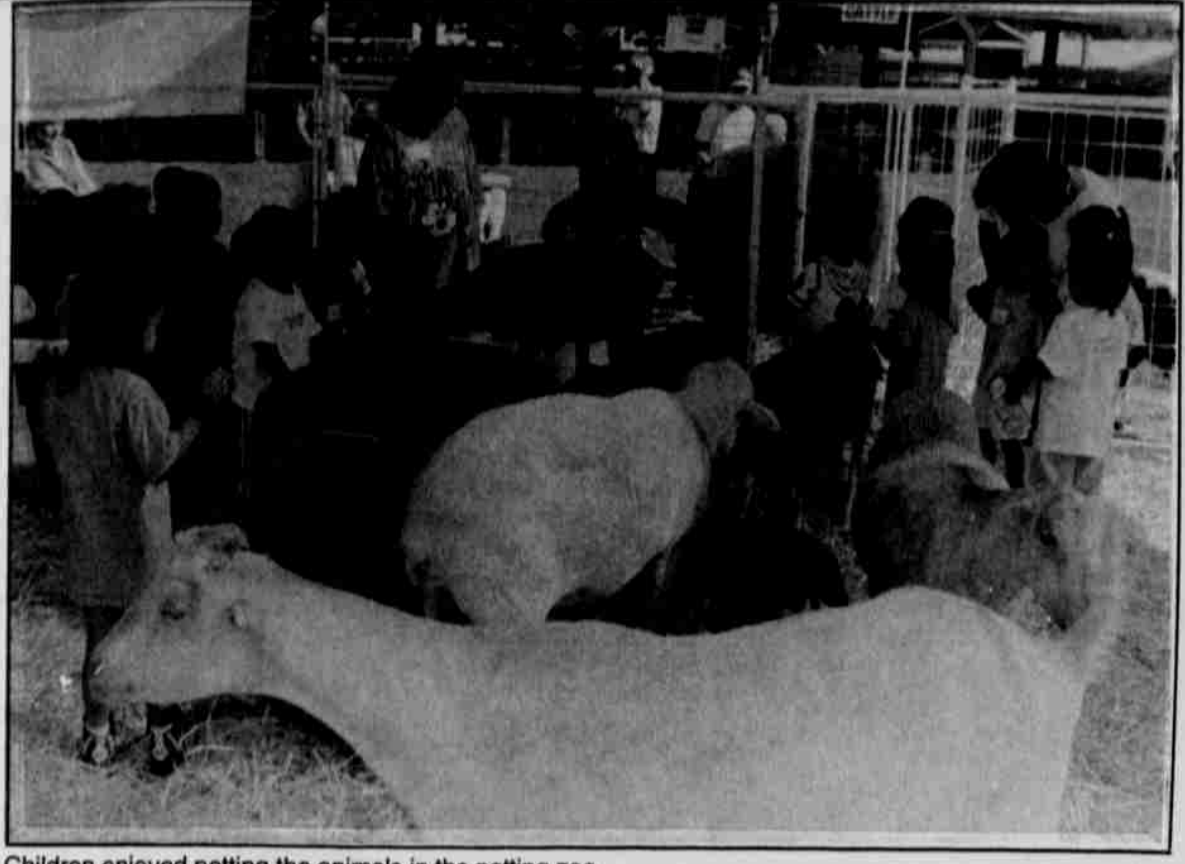

Elmer L. Tom, age 93, died of natural causes at the Mt. View Nursing Home in Madras, Oregon July 27, 1996. He was born March 13, 1903 to Thomas L. and Rosa (Wacheno) Tom. He was an enrolled member of the Confederated Tribes of Grande Ronde.

Tom was a resident of Warm Springs for 72 years. His hobbies included hunting, fishing and baseball. He also liked to rodeo and train horses. He married his wife Christine, who preceded him in death in 1995, during the mid-1940s.

Survivors include his children Frances Allen, Janet Billey, Eldon Tom, Lee Tom and Rosie Tom; numerous grandchildren and five great-grandchildren. One brother also preceded him in death.

Dressing ceremonies were held Tuesday, July 30 at 3 p.m. at the Agency Longhouse in Warm Springs with Reggie Winshut, Nelson Moses and Earl Tuft officiating. Overnight services follow. Burial was Wednesday, July 31 at the Upper Seekseequa Cemetery.
