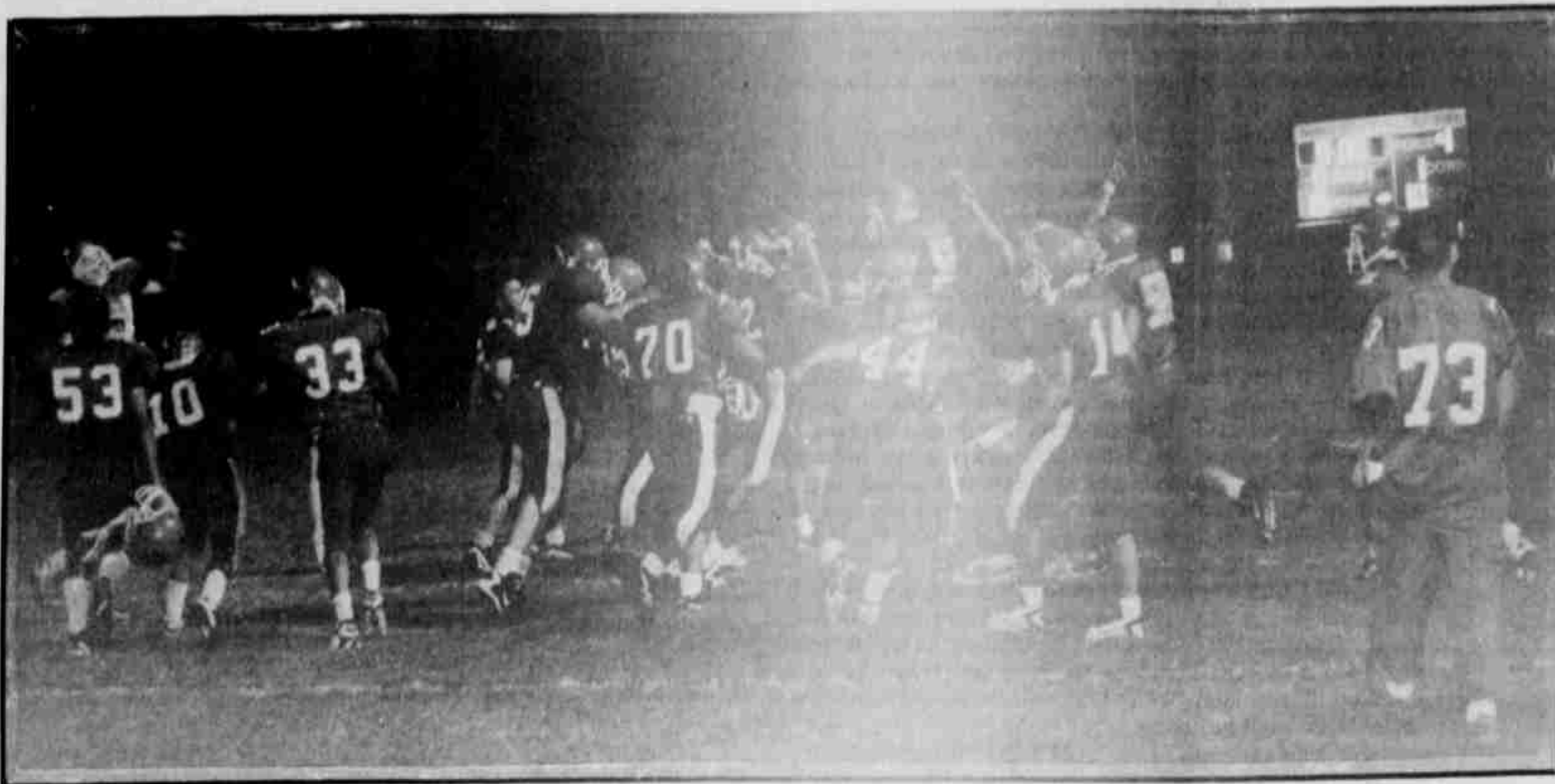

Madras defeats The Dalles 18-8 in homecoming meet

The Buffs won homecoming against The Dalles Indians Thursday night October 10, at the Buff dome. The Buffs were led by their starting quarterback/defensive back Michael Kirsch, who accounted for two of the Buffs' touchdowns.

The first quarter started with The Dalles Indians taking the opening kickoff and marching down field. Indians running back Ben Doniven broke loose for a 48-yard run before being caught by Riddle at the Buffs' 10 yard line. The Dalles quarterback Casey Hayes tried to throw a slant pass when Kirsch stepped in front of the intended receiver at the one and made a spectacular return of 99-yards for six points.

After The Dalles got the ball back they tried to pass and again Kirsch

picked their pocket this time Kirsch returned the ball to the five yard line of the Indians. The Dalles defense stopped the Buffs at the 1 yard line, where they took over. Madras defense kept the Indians pinned down, forcing them to punt.

A Madras bounce put the Buffs at the Indians' 18 yard line. On first down Kirsch completed an 8 yard strike to Riddle making it second and two. The Indians lined up offside on second down and Madras had a first down at the five yard line. Keller Christensen was stopped for no gain on first down. With The Dalles defense watching for Christensen to run the Buffs called Kirsch's number who ran it in untouched. The PAT was no good making the score 12-0 Madras. After a Buffs punt the Indians

look over at their own 18-yard line. On A third and long the Buffs forced a fumble. Willis Bagley recovered for the Buffs at the 16-yard line. A play later Christensen rumbled into the end zone. The point after failed, leaving the score 18-2 Madras. The Dalles still had life in them. they used a short passing attack to move the ball down field and score with less than two minutes left in the half. Donivan ran 16-yards for the touchdown. The score was 18-8, after the extra point failed.

Each team could not move the ball in the third, defense dominated the quarter.

The fourth was played even with each team moving the ball with some success. The Indians threatened to score about half way through the quarter. The Dalles went to the Buffs 4-yard and had a 1 and ten. The Buffs defense tightened up and forced another fumble, taking over at the 5 yard line. Madras had to punt, but they dodged a bullet. Buff improve chances for playoff berth

The White Buffs put themselves in a good spot to make the state football playoffs, with a come from behind win against Wilsonville last Friday October 18, at the Buff dome. The win improved their league record to 4-1.

Wilsonville had the Buffs down mid-way though the second quarter 21-8. The White Buffs defense stepped it up a notch and got the Buffs back into the game. First big play was Brian Sites who read a screen pass perfect and stole the pass returning it to the Wildcats 40 yard line. The Buffs drove down to the 8 yard line, where Kirsch tossed a 8 touchdown pass to Rico. That brought the Buffs within a touchdown of the Wildcats 21-14. Riddle ended the first half scoring with a 53 yard touchdown reception from Kirsch. The point after was no good, making the score at half time 21-20 Wilsonville.

Riddle got the Buffs going again this time with a interception,

returning it to the Wildcats 40 yard line. After Rico and Christensen runs the Buffs were at the Wildcats 1 yard line. Kirsch ran a keeper for six, then passed to Riddle for two points, to put Madras ahead 28-21. The Buffs score again on a Christensen 1-yard run, Kirsch passed to Riddle for two more, putting the Buffs in control 36-21.

Wilsonville made the score closer with a touchdown in the fourth to end the scoring for both teams. The final score read Buffs 36-27.

Coach Deleretto credited these players with outstanding efforts. Riddle had a great game offensively and defensively. Willis Bagley and Glenden Smith for their play on the line.

Kirsch had a good night passing for 90-yard and two TD passes, also one TD run and two 2-point conversions. Christensen had 125-yard on 25 carries and one TD. The Buffs' next game is at Sherwood October 25.

From the pro—Proper putting possible

With the arrival of the cold weather, frost, and threats of snow most of you will not be able to play as much golf as you would like. To help curb your hunger for golf I recommend you practice putting. You can do it inside next to the fireplace, or during a commercial break watching football. I'm sure we all would like to improve our scores, and improved putting is one of the fastest way to do this. As Ben Crenshaw once said, "A good putt can make up for a lot of sins."

There are three basics to good putting.

1. Proper tempo of the stroke. When putting I like to think of a metronome, going back and fourth,

in an even one, two rhythm. Another way to think of the correct rhythm is to think of your putting strokes as pendulum on a grandfather clock. Back and through, one, two.

2. Proper speed of the putt. We must remember that speed determines the line of the putt. So first decide how hard or soft you are going to stroke the putt. The best putters in the world focus 70-80 percent on the speed of their putt, and the rest on line. The majority of your three putts come from bad speed, not bad line. It was once said that 99% of all putts left short don't go in. Well it is also true that 99% of all putts that race by the hole don't go in either. Focus on

speed, then on direction.

3. Use a routine. To consistently putt well you need to have a routine. Watch the golf on television, they all approach their putts the same way, take the same amount of practice strokes, and hit it. One of the simplest routines is to take a practice stroke, line up the putter, then your body, look at the hole, focus back back on the ball and roll it in the hole. Don't give yourself a chance to think about missing it!

Putting is the simplest of all strokes a golfer makes. If you remember to keep it simple, and stay with a routine, your scorekeeping will become easier too.
