over 1,200 "select" trees. Projects planned for Badger and Swamp Creek Seed Orchards include fertilization, pest management, disking, and fire break maintenance.

Projects planned for our western white pine program include nursery maintenance of tree seedlings, testing of seedlings for resistance to white pine blister rust and maintenance of our select trees.

The seed collection goals for this year are 400 bushels of cones with emphasis on ponderosa pine, western larch, noble fir, Douglas-fir, western white pine, and some lodge

AMOUNT BUDGETED GEOGRAPHIC INFORMATION SYS-

The Geographic Information System (GIS) has been in existence as a program for the past seven years. Over these seven years the program has evolved to a totally standalone system owned and operated totally by the Tribes. Forestry has contributed significantly to this program over the past five years. With the onset of 1997 we see a further evolution of this program with increasing staff interaction with the program on an operational basis. This forestry line item still supports over 65% of the hardware and soft-

ware costs of this program. As the forestry sections contribution for these necessary operational programs we have developed the following budget in conjunction with the Tribal GIS Manager. Funding for GIS Staff

OGY CONTRACT Biological services are being provided by the Fish and Wildlife section of the Natural Resource Department. Hydrology services are being provided by the Water and Soil section. In 1997 we are funding a tribal wildlife biologist, a fisheries biologist, a hydrologist, and a portion of the soil scientist. These staff employees will be utilized to provide technical input to Project Assessments for the 1998

timber sale projects. WILDLIFE BIO \$40,000 FISH BIO \$40,000 HYDROLOGIST \$54,600 AMOUNT BUDGETED \$134,600

CARTOGRAPHIC SERVICES We are requesting \$9,000 to cover a contract we have for mapping and drafting services. This person works with GIS and with PIDT members to produce a wide variety of maps used in the Natural Resource Programs.

AMOUNT BUDGETED PRE-COMMERCIAL THINNING We have identified 300 acres to be treated in our pre-commercial thinning program in 1997. These units are predominantly existing plantations that are in need of stocking level control. Funding is insufficient to meet

all program needs. AMOUNT BUDGETED PERSONNEL

This budget line provides staffing for all aspects of the Forestry program. Included are two Tribal member trainee positions in the budget in our continuous effort to offer Tribal members training opportunities. are on-the-job training supplemented by various formalized training classes and workshops. This is a four year program. We cannot guarantee permanent jobs, but the chances of getting either a federal or Tribal

permanent position are good. AMOUNT BUDGETED \$680,000 INTERN PROGRAM

For the past several years we have had a program within the Branch of Forestry for Tribal members in which we select two individuals to participate in college level classes that will lead to a 4 year degree in forest management. This year we are budgeting for two positions. William Wilson and Michael Leecy are the current interns. Recent graduates from the program are: Mark Jackson, Doug Manion, and Robert Macy Jr.

AMOUNT BUDGETED FORESTRY PROJECT MITIGATION ROAD REHABILITATION This line will provide money to make im-

provements in natural resources that are negatively impacted by logging activities. These funds are a necessary part of the IRMP process. Natural Resource Sections in the future will share these costs. Projects planned for this year include road closures and block ages to protect wildlife, ripping compacted ground, grass seeding to control erosion, and road rocking to reduce erosion. AMOUNT BUDGETED

CAPITALIZED EQUIPMENT RE-

OUEST Better access to the forest area during the winter months will help complete work in a timely manner. We will be looking for a used snow cat from government sources to accomplish this task. Our ATV's are in need of replacement, we are planning to purchase two new ones this year. A theodolite will make property line surveying faster and more accurate.

AMOUNT BUDGETED \$ 5,000 \$ 5,000 DATA PROCESSING

The computers are now an integral part of Forestry and are being utilized by personnel for programs such as total resource information system, geographical information system, stand exam, plant classification, logging residue, stocking survey, seed orchard design, presale cruise, appraisal, forest inventory, economic analysis, cost accounting, budgeting, etc. The following are expected expenditures this year:

Development/Timber Sales Building.
AMOUNT BUDGETED \$ 2

MISCELLANEOUS In a program as large and diverse as Timber Management Deduction's program, it is necessary to have a contingency fund to take care of unplanned expenditures, supplies, field equipment and miscellaneous items. Items such as ribbon, paint, paint gun parts, diazo paper, office supplies, warehouse supplies, axe handles, toner, clinometer, calculators, drafting film, flag stakes, maintenance agreements (copier), aerial surveys, etc., are purchased with this budget item. AMOUNT BUDGETED

TRAINING AND TRAVEL Training funds are used for Tribal employees to keep up with the state-of-the-art Forest Management; attend important conferences and meetings; and to implement and upgrade various forest development, fire management and other forest management pro-

These funds further furnish ongoing training for Tribal member trainees, foresters, technicians, clerks and aids. We continue to place increased emphasis on training Tribal members, in order to more rapidly increase knowledge, skills, and performance level to prepare them for more responsible positions. This line item has been used to cover a portion of the cost of the students we have in AMOUNT BUDGETED

CONTRACTS TO HOT SHOT CREW

Members of the Warm Springs Hot Shot Crew are utilized on special projects when they are not being utilized on wildfire, prescribed burning, reforestation projects and outside contracts; to assist our regular staff on such items as block traverses, timber marking, surveys, line and road clearing. Also, we will train members of this crew to do tree planting inspections to assist the regular staff in several areas of our program. At this time, the majority of the funds are for under-burning and other prescribed burning that should and can be done by the Warm Springs crew for which other funds are not

AMOUNT BUDGETED \$ 45,000 TRIBAL YOUTH

Tribal youth program will be used to introduce all resource management departments to prospective future employees. We are offering a few tours of various Natural Resource operations to observe and discuss them and make these youth more aware of the value of their resources.

This program will be operated within the Natural Resource Program under a mentorship approach, opposed to the former practice of transferring the funds to the Summer Work Program for a crew based approach. The purpose for this move is to achieve more of a career development emphasis administered by Natural Resource personnel using a more personalized approach to youth involvement. For the past several years we've recruited Madras High School students who are participating in the High School Forestry Program to work in the summer for the Branch of Forestry. We try to get Tribal member students and expose them to the practical appli-

cations of the forestry profession and increase their interest in pursuing forestry as a career. This program has been successful and we are seeing more interest at the High School level in forestry as a profession.

AMOUNT BUDGETED CONSERVATION AND ENFORCE-

We have been developing an enforcement program within the Natural Resource Department due to increased use of our forest lands by non-tribal members. Incursion onto the reservation, primarily on the McQuinn Strip, has been increasing greatly in the last few years. Types of problems range from snowmobiles to illegal fire wood cutting. This year's program is being increased to fund at least one full time position, plus expenses. Funding is also provided for existing Natural Resources staff to participate in Ranger Program activities over and above their regular

AMOUNT BUDGETED VEHICLES

Tribal vehicles like Tribal personnel are needed to supplement Bureau programs. Permanent and temporary vehicles, rental, damage expenses, etc.

AMOUNT BUDGETED \$ 38,000 PROFESSIONAL SERVICES

This line item will be limited to the needs of the Tribal Council and projects specified by the Branch of Forestry. These projects include the following: 1. Noble fir study 1994-1996, conducted by
