The Indian Warrior, The Veterans Corner June 25, 1950, The Korean War begins

Today the veterans of the Korean conflict can remember back into their young lives when the North Korean Communist forces invaded South Korea, on June 25, 1950, to start the Korean war. It was their time to get into some action as the US. decided to aid the South Korean army, and stop the Communist aggression.

With the young green troops the US entered what was referred to as a Police action, little did they know the North Korean army was more trained than expected and were out in full force to push the South Koreans out of existence.

The fighting was fierce where all along the south of the 38th parallel the Communists were pushing the South Korean and Americans back. The fighting was much much more than the US expected. The first encounter with the Communist forces were near Wunson, South Korea. Young men not much more than 18 and so fighting the invading forces of the North. The fighting was tough for the young troops to where they were pushed right back to the south end of Korea.

Those were hard long dark days for the green troops of the U.S. facing the North Korean well trained Communist army. Dig in fight and pull back, dig in fight and pull back. Help didn't arrive fast enough where the Americans were forced to the southern tip of Korea where they made their stand around Pusan. On September 15, 1950, the US. made the big landing at Enchon far north cutting off the supply line to the North Korean troops to the south. From there the push was back to the north, regaining the capitol City of Suel, where it was handed back to the South Korean government. The ROK Troops crossed the 38th parallel and the whole front was north of the boarder. Near Thanksgiving the troops were near the Yalu River in North Korea, where it appeared all the troops would be home for Christmas. But little did they know the Chinese Army would get evolved and thousands crossed down to help the North Korean army, where they surrounded troops at the Chanjgin Reservoir where they had to fight their way out to the sea to be picked up.

The Chines used the Psychological war fare on the young green US. troops where they would gather just over the rise and yell, shout, bang on tin cans blow bugles and just the sound of all that racket would was fought.

The famous battles of Pork Chop Hill, the invasion at Enchon, and the drive toward the northern boarder. No one remembers the battles of Sniper ridge, Old Baldy, Punch Bowl, where some of the hottest battles ragged during the Korean War.

The war went on from June 25, 1950 to July 27, 1953, when the Armistice was signed to end one of the bloodiest as any war that
