Tribal voters approve senior citizen assisted living center

Tribal voters, on Wednesday, March 4, approved the proposed Senior Citizen Assisted Living Center. Of the 717 ballots cast, 645 were yes, 69 were no and three were spoiled. The approved referendum authorizes the expenditure of \$3 million in selfdetermination funds for the \$4.1 million facility.

The Center will be built near the Senior Citizen Center. The plans for the 40,800-square-foot building include 10 units for short-term stays and convalescence, 12 one-bedroom units and 18 two-bedroom units. The
