**Vietnam Traveling Wall Visits Northwest**



The Traveling replica of the Vietnam Veterans memorial will visit three Northwest locations in the near future. It's first stop will be in Vancouver, Washington, on May 21-25.

The 248 foot replica will move on to Klamath Falls, Oregon, for display on June 6-12; and then will be in Molalla, Oregon July 2-5, 1998.

In Vancouver, the Wall exhibit will be open to the public, 24

hours a day, at the Parade Grounds near Officers Row on the Fort Vancouver Historic Reserve.

Numerous special events are planned for the Memorial Day weekend including a candlelight ceremony, a Native American pow-wow, a name reading ceremony, and a community dinner.

The following week, the Wall moves to Klamath Falls, Oregon, where it will be on display at Kingsley Field. Opening ceremonies will be held on June 6, at 10:00 a.m. The ceremony will include various speakers and a reading of the 18 names of

In a separate location on Kingsley Field, there will be a Veterans Memorial Classic Car Show on June 6 and 7. A static display of military equipment will also be available for viewing.

  - A) It will then be presented to the Alcohol & Drug Council (which meets every 3rd Wednesday). The Alcohol & Drug Council will review the proposal and a motion will be made to fund or deny the request.
  - Please keep in mind: All proposals submitted should address the needs of youth, incorporate traditional/cultural practices to the maximum extent possible and be oriented to facilitate family and community interaction.
- Proposals should also be able to serve the secondary purpose of functioning as positive social support systems for both youth and adults in the early stages of recovery from substance abuse problems.

**Headstones and Markers Provided by VA**

VA provides headstones and markers for the unmarked graves of veterans anywhere in the world and of eligible dependents of veterans buried in national, state veteran or military post cemeteries. Flat bronze, flat granite, flat marble, upright granite and upright marble types are available to mark the grave in a style consistent with the cemetery. Niche markers also are available for identifying cremated remains.

Headstones and markers are inscribed with the name of the deceased, branch of service, and the years of birth and death. Optional items that may be inscribed are military grade, rank or rate; war service such as "World

War II"; months and days of birth and death; an emblem reflecting one's religion; and text indicating valor awards. When burial is in a national, state veterans or military post cemetery, the headstone or marker is ordered through the cemetery, which will place it on the grave. Information on style, inscription and shipping can be obtained from the cemetery.

When burial occurs in a cemetery other than a national, military post or state veterans cemetery, the headstone or marker must be applied for from VA. It is shipped at government expense. VA, however, does not pay the cost of placing the headstone or marker. To apply, complete VA

form 40-1330 and forward it to Director, Memorial Programs Service (403A), National Cemetery System, Department of Veterans Affairs, Washington, DC 20420.

Forms and assistance are available at VA regional office. For information regarding the status of an application, write to the Director, Memorial Programs Service (403A), or call 1-800-697-6947. VA cannot issue a headstone or marker for a spouse or child buried in a private cemetery. Twenty-year reservists are eligible for a headstone or grave marker if they are entitled to military retired pay at the time of death.

**Home Loans for Native American Vets-----**

VA direct home loans are available to eligible Native American veterans who wish to purchase, construct or improve a home on Native American trust land. These loans may be used to simultaneously purchase and improve a home. Direct loans also are available to reduce the interest rate on existing loans obtained under the program. AV direct loans may be limited to the cost of the home or \$80,000, whichever is less. Before a Native American veteran can obtain a loan under this program, tribal officials and the Secretary of Veterans Affairs must sign an agreement that spells out the program. A funding fee must be paid to VA. The fee is 1.25 percent for loans to purchase, construct or improve a home. For loans to refinance an existing loan, the fee is 0.5 percent of the loan amount. Veterans receiving compensation for service-connected disability are not required to pay the funding fee. Veterans who qualify ased on service in the Reserves or National Guard that was not active duty are charged a funding fee of 2 percent of the loan amount. The funding fee may be paid in cash or included in the loan. Other closing costs

may not be included in the loan. The following may not be included in the loan: VA appraisal, credit report, loan processing fee, title search, title insurance, recording fees, transfer taxes, survey charges and hazard insurance.

**Repossessed Houses**

VA sells homes that have been acquired after foreclosure of a VA guaranteed loan. These homes are available to both veterans and nonveterans. Contact local real estate agents for available listings.

**Safeguards for Veterans**

1. Homes completed less than a year before purchase with VA financing and inspected during construction by either VA or HUD must meet VA requirements.
2. VA may suspend from the loan program those who take unfair advantage of veteran borrowers or decline to sell a new home to make a loan to an eligible veteran of good credit because of race, color, religion, sex, disability, family status or national origin.
3. The builder of a new home is required to give the purchasing veteran a one-year warranty that the home has been

constructed to VA approved plans and specifications. A similar warranty must be given for new manufactured homes.

4. In cases of new construction completed under VA or HUD inspection, VA may pay or otherwise compensate the veteran borrower for correction of structural defects seriously affecting livability if assistance is requested within four years of a home-loan guaranty.
5. The borrower obtaining a loan may only be charged the fees and other charges prescribed by VA as allowable.
6. The borrower can prepay without penalty the entire loan or any part not less than the amount of one installment or \$100.
7. VA encourages holders to extend forbearance if a borrower becomes temporarily unable to meet the terms of the loan.

Ms. Scott was very active throughout the years. She was on the Madras High School basketball team, Warm Springs softball league, participated in rodeo events such as barrel racing. She began in the Peewee rodeos then advanced to the Western States All-Indian Rodeo circuit. Among her achievements are being Queen of Tygh Valley Indian Rodeo in 1983, Queen of the Holiday All-Indian Basketball Tournament in 1983; T-ball coach; Reading Tutor at the War Springs Elementary; Rodeo Coordinator representing the Robert Wood Johnson Healthy Nations. Doots was renowned in the art of beadwork. Her work has graced the cultural, traditional and customs arena of all Indian Country. Regaling government, state and tribal dignitaries, elders and royalty as well as providing exquisite gifts for family members, friends, giveaways and giftshops in all of the Northwest area. She was also a life time member of the Warm Springs Full Gospel Church and the church choir.

Nadine was very involved with her children, encouraging them to participate in all sports activities as well as ceremonial and powwow dancing. Her daughters followed in her footsteps as royalty in the Lil Miss Warm Springs Pageant and in the Pi-Ume-Sha Treaty Days. Family and friends remember her with her exhibited congeniality, inner beauty, graciousness, her high respect for her elders and above all her wonderful humor. She was highly respected for her enduring strength. She was known as a "tough" lady.

Throughout the latter years she was employed as a teacher with the Early Childhood Education Center (Daycare); a committee secretary with the Tribal Council; secretary with the Fish & Wildlife department; Work experience coordinator with the WEDD program and an on-call secretary with the Confederated Tribes of Warm Springs.

Preceding her in death are daughter Natasha, who died at the time of the accident January 6, 1998; grandmother Lela Scott, and grandfather Joseph Thompson.

Survivors include her parents Daniel G. & Christine Scott, children Paul Scott, Nicole, Tianna, Rachelle & Charley Ann Herkshan, significant other Leevi Herkshan; brother Larry (Missy) Scott; sister Sandra (Dan) Scott McGill; grandmother Gladys Thompson; grandfather Elmer Scott Sr. all of Warm Springs. She leaves numerous aunts, uncles and many relatives.

Prayer service was held at Gladys Thompson residence on Friday, May 1, 1998. The dressing ceremony was held at the Agency Longhouse on Saturday May 2, 1998 at 5 p.m. with Ellen Thompson, Margaret Boise and Louise Hellon officiating.
