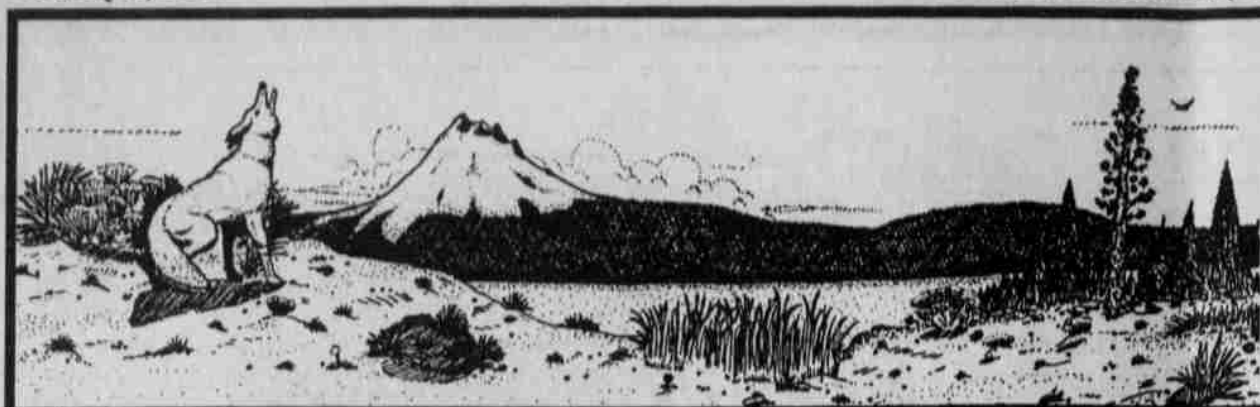

There will be over \$35,000 in money and prizes.

Grand entries will be July 3 & 4 at 3:00 p.m. and July 5 at 1:00 p.m. with Kenny Scabbyrobe from White Swan, Washington as Master of Ceremonies.

Registration opens July 2 at 5:00 p.m. and July 3 at 1:00 p.m.

Along with the reigning drum

champions Blacklodge of White Swan, Washington there will be many other drums such as Northern Cree, Saddle Lake, Alberta, Canada; Cathedral Lake, Keremeos, BC, Canada and Mandaree Singers from New Town, ND, USA.

All drums are welcome. First ten drums registered will receive \$100 a day.

The drumming contest prizes are: 1st place—\$2,000; 2nd place—\$1,500; 3rd place—\$1,000; 4th place—\$800; 5th place—\$500.

Adult categories include Men's and Women's traditional, Mens and Womens Fancy, Mens Grass and Womens jingle, Mens and Womens Golden Age. These category prizes are 1st place—\$1,000; 2nd place—\$600; 3rd place—\$400; and 4th place—\$200.
