# **Umatilla opens their Tamastslikt Institute**

The Confederated Tribes of the Umatilla Indian Reservation today opened their Tamastslikt Culture Institute to the public. The 45,000 square foot visitor and education center on the Umatilla Indian Reservation has been in the works since 1988 and is the fifth visitor center in Oregon that highlights the Oregon Trail immigration. Tamastslikt, which translates to "interpret" in the Walla Walla native language, is the only one that tells the story from a Native American perspective.

The permanent exhibits not only talk about the Oregon Trail, but also share the culture, history, current events, and future ambitions of the Cavuse, Umatilla and Walla Walla Tribes (the three tribes that make up the Confederated Tribes of the Umatilla Reservation).

A grand opening ceremony was held on August 1 at 9 a.m. and featured a horse parade with tribal mem-bers in full regalia. A recognition

The other was because of court, costs but with no available job in the area, I choose to live in Northern Rural Nevada. There's no way I can

There has to be a name, that's what it says at the bottom of page four. My last letter went through both of my supervisors before it was printed. It is not their opinion but mine.


