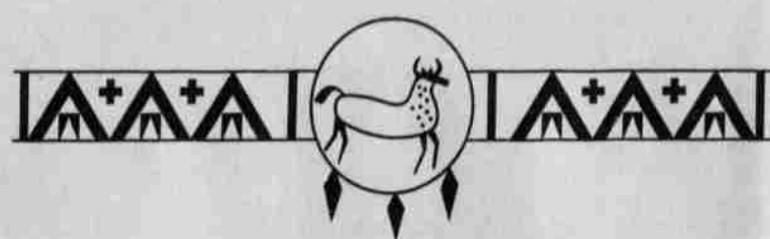

Just an opinion on present and future

Everyone should voice their opinion on our future and the gaming establishment. A few years ago we all went to the Polls to decide on if we wanted to go into gaming or not.

Well we did and all agreed to go into the gaming field on a trial basis for at least five (5) years. Another question was the location, either here in Warm Springs, along hi-way 26, or at the Kahneeta lodge. Majority of the voters elected to have it at Kahneeta for several reasons. One of the main concerns was to improve employment for the local tribal membership, and also to draw more tourists to the resort.

At that time I voted that we go into the gaming situation, but was apposed to the location, my selection was to have it along hi-

way 26, and a location I thought was a good spot was at the junction of hi-way 26 and hi-way 9. People told me the cost would be too great to build up there. What's the big deal? If we were going to make money that would have been one to find out. It would or wouldn't have paid for itself.

Now we have our gaming at the Kahneeta lodge and we are already feeling the crunch of not enough business. We are also in the process of looking into other locations for our Casino. The area at Hood River is ideal for our future Casino, right along that east-west freeway along the Columbia River.

I don't think we should bow to the White race or the settlement a Hood River, because they think it would hurt their economy. As a matter of fact it probably would

help their economy and they don't realize it. They never gave it any thought to better themselves even if it hurt the Indian race. Take a look at The Dalles dam that flooded the ancient Indian fishing grounds. It hurt the Northwest Indian tribes but did it matter to them. Heck no, they could care less of what happens to the Native Americans. We have lost so much to the progress of the nation with out any compensation. Even at that the Non-Indians feel we are taking advantage of them when they open up fishing for a few days when in the olden days that was a lively hood for most tribal members.

They can't understand why we do things like hunt and fish in ceded areas. Many non-Indians never have heard of our treaty rights. And even if they do they think those rights should be done away with. But those were the terms set forth at that time and should be the law of the land.

There are those who oppose the idea of a Casino in the Gorge near Hood River. They have every right to feel as they do. Just as the Indians feel the will of putting up a Casino there. Everyone has a right to believe what ever they want, this is a democratic society we live in today. But like I said before, no one could care less what the Indians felt like when the Ancient fishing grounds were flooded over and gone for ever.

What is the New Business Office?

The Business Office was created to make admissions to the VA system for inpatient and outpatient care an easier process.

It includes the Enrollment Office, Billing and Data Management, and Fee Service.

The Business Office will be your first stop when applying for care within the Department of Veterans Affairs Medical Center.

The Enrollment Office;

The main function of the Enrollment Office is to work with patients to help smooth the application process.

Other functions of the Enrollment Office include:

Scheduled admissions: Patients are pre-registered over the telephone to speed up the admission process on the day of admission so patients can get to their room as soon as possible.

Eligibility: All information regarding eligibility for care at the VA

Representatives of the Enrollment Office will also help with Registrations, Applications, and Beneficiary Travel.

Billing and Data Management Unit

VA bills health insurance companies for nonservice-connected treatment furnished to covered veterans. Some veterans, based on their income, are required to make co-payments for their treatment and medications. The Billing Unit prepares bills for insurance companies and for those veterans who need to make co-payments.

Fee Services

This unit is primarily responsible for processing fee claims. It will also help with the following:

- Outpatient
- Non-VA Hospitalization
- Community Nursing

- Home Health Radiation
Therapy

I am, like many others, powerless to stop it. Some scientists have even begun to find evidence of an alcohol gene. I know alcohol is wrong, regardless of any

excuse.

I have seen and felt the bad effects of alcohol on minors; on my own children and on myself. From even before I or our sons have any vivid memory of being a child. I remember alcohol.
