Memorial Day: A day we reflect to the past to honor all those men and women who died for our country, also to honor those who served their country in time of un-rest in the world and in wartime. There were services held across the country and miniature American Flags were placed on all Veterans graves, as everyone has lost a relative, friend or a buddy during war time.

From the Trenches of France during World War I, where today almost all those veterans are all gone with just a hand full still alive.

The battle grounds during World War II, when the U.S.

entered the war after the sneak raid on Pearl Harbor by the Japanese, were in the Pacific area at Midway, and battles at sea with the Japanese navy. Prior to that there were U.S. Forces stationed in the Philippines who were taken prisoners of war, after resistance and fighting in Bataan, Corrigadore and Mindanao. The Japanese staged the death march of all prisoners where many died along the way.

From the time the Japanese joined the Axis forces of Germany and Italy, the Japanese went on rampage in the Pacific taking Island after Island and all through Indo China. The Americans were on the defensive until the landing in the Solomon Islands on Guadalcanal where they first made their offensive move. From there it was a long slow process of taking the Islands back from the Japanese.

Big battles raged at Peleliu, Truk, Tarawa, Siapan, Iwo Jima to name some of the biggest battles where many many lives were lost. Both land and sea battles with the Japanese.

In Europe the Americans started the offensive by invading North Africa Pushing the German forces back to Italy where the foot soldier did most of the fighting. The elements were tough as the weather was bad in the winter where the troops were in deep mud.

D-Day on June 6, 1944, where the troops hit the beaches of Normandy, which turned the tide on the picture of the war in Europe.

There some tough battles during that time like the battle of the bulge, and many more before peace was restored in Europe, as fighting raged on in the Pacific. But in August the U.S. dropped the atom bomb on Japan, and that ended the War.

"The 38th Parallel." What's that? Well that's the dividing line between the North and South Korea. And on June 25, 1950, the North Korean army invaded South Korea in full force starting that war, and as South Korea asked the U.N. for assistance President Truman announced he had the U.S. Troops go the aid the South Korean army to restore peace, just a little police action as they referred to it at that time. Little did they know the opposition was so tough and were not to be handled lightly. The North Korean Army was pushing the South Korean army right down toward Pusan. The U.S. forces joined the South Korean Army at Suwon and met tougher force than they expected and were pushed back right along with the South Korean army. Everything bottlenecked at Pusan, where the U.S. forces dug in to stop the North Korean army

A big factor to change the picture was the Inchon landing near Seoul, Korea, to cut off supply lines to the North Korean forces. This made a big change as the drive started band North retaking, Seoul the South Korean Capitol and on back to the 38th Parallel. They didn't stop at the 38th parallel but they pushed on north taking the North Korean Capitol city of P'yongyang. After that they pushed the North Korean army back to the Yalu River the northern boarder of Korea. Everything was looking good and that the boys would be home for Christmas, when "Wham," another force entered the picture as the Chinese army came down over ran the U.S. and South Korean forces out numbering them at times 20-1. Forces were cut off at the Changjin Res., where they had to fight their way out to Hungnam on the east coast of Korea.

Some of the bloodiest battles raged in Korea, like Pork Chop Hill, Heartbreak Ridge, Sniper Ridge, Old Baldy, Punch Bowl, Lukes Castle to name few of the big battles.

Korea, the Forgotten war. When it ended there was some rejoicing but no big deal. The Korean Vets was just a thing of the past and no one really knows how bad it was there.

Today as we reflect back we honor all veterans, men and women who have served their country, willing to put up their lives for our country, from WW I, WWII, Korea, Vietnam, Persian Gulf, and the present day involvement in Europe....AAHH-NAH-CHI-TOON!!!
