Charley, also presented and talked about the materials that are used when dipping for salmon.

There were other areas of interest opened for viewing such as tribal member Margaret Boise, who did a presentation on how to cut salmon and eels for drying to

Another Warm Springs fisherman and tribal member, Terry Courtney, spoke on the fishing subjects that Indians are connected with. Sam Culps, also shared stories and talked about who taught him how to fish, where his family site is located, and just general information

Nola Queahpama shared on how Head Start Teachers emerge Traditional Culture into the class room such as language, Legends, making outfits for the mini powwows they have at our Agency Long House, and how the children are taken to field trips to traditional food sites. The Oral History Program open house, was offered and presented by the Warm Springs Cultural Resources department.

Department staff were available

in the former library of Buff Learning Madras High will implement an

in-school child care service next fall in hopes of keeping some of the 44 students in its Teen Parent Program from dropping out because of babysitting problems, but the decision was not without controversy.

"Some students have extreme difficulty finding child care, and this will enable us to retain them through graduation," MHS Principal Ken Cantrell told 509-J Board members during a presentation made Monday night along with Teen Parent Program

Coordinator Lisbet Hornung. Hornung said three of her students had dropped out this year because their child care arrangements fell through and they had to stay home and take care of their babies rather than attend school.

Cantrell said the day care facility

Center would start out small, with room for only eight toddlers ages 6 weeks to 30 months. If successful, the day care could expand into a house or modular unit, but those options would be more expensive, he

Child care would only be available to MHS students, not outside persons or school staff, he noted, referring to concerns from other local child care businesses about competition. Besides providing stable infant care, the facility would also be used for MHS Human Development classes taught by the school's home economics departments. Hornung estimated it would cost about \$10,000 to remodel the room at Buff Learning Center for infant care, and said she is applying for a grant of \$25,000 from the Department of Education to cover

that cost plus provide for start-up equipment and materials. Citing philosophical differences, board member Tom Norton was against schools getting into the child care business and felt emphasis should be put elsewhere, such as on high school students who can't read.

Board member Jim Manion said he shared Norton's reservations about taking on child care but said, "I also agree (it could) provide the opportunity for these young parents to graduate. It's unfortunate we have to do it, but we have to." Nine-year board member Jeff Sanders said he supported in-school day care 100 percent. "I'd like to see us saving kids, not judging parents. We've made some inroads with the drop out rate, and anything that can be done to help with it should be done."


