## Madras White Buffaloes win opener on the road 20-19

have gone for a big gainer. Jackson and David White were in on several tackles to stop the hard running backs of LaPine. With play like that there could be a lot of surprises as the season progresses.

The Buffs are a little weak in the kicking department but with a little work things can improve in that department, along with some other surprises that may be in store for the future.

Just before the intermission the Buffs were ahead 14-7, when the Hawks scored and their kick failed to leave the score the Buffs 14, LaPine 13. The Hawks came at the Buffs with an on-side kick and recovered the ball to go on offense with time running out in the first half and just before the half ended the LaPine Hawks Troy Haslip kicked a 27 yard field goal to gain the lead during the intermission 16-14.

The second half was a battle on mid field with no scoring until midway through the third quarter as Haslip split the uprights once again on a 24 yard field goal extending their lead to 19-14.

With good running by Christensen and Jaca the Buffs were able to move the ball down field where Jaca capped the drive on a run into the end zone to put the Buffs ahead 20-19, and that was the way the scoring ended. A good showing for both teams so early in the season, as there was not that many penalties for each team which shows a well balanced team work for both teams.

The next game for the Buffs will be September 10, as they will host the strong Burns Hillanders, in another non-league action, here in Madras with game time at 7:00 p.m.

The LaPine Hawks dished out just about everything but the dining room table but fell short on the score board where the Buffaloes were able to score and make the big plays at the right time to come away with a win in the opening football game of the season by the score of 20-19.

With the Madras running game from Keller Christensen, Jake Jaca and Jacoby Ellesbury, the speedsters were able to put the points on the score board for the Buffaloes.

The LaPine Hawks were very stingy with the ball and had more offensive

The Buffs started to move the ball down the field with some good runs by the backs. From the nine yard line Christensen ran in for the score, but the kick failed and the Hawks held the slim lead 7-6.

The Hawks were marching down field nearing TD land when Jacoby Ellesbury picked off a King pass and scooted down the sideline for a 91 yard Touchdown. The Buffs went for two points with Jake Jaca running the ball in to give the Buffs the lead 14-7.

In the early season play there were some hard pad pounding and popping by the Madras linemen as they broke through with hands up in the air they batted down several passes made by the Hawks. Allen Jackson batted down a pass that appeared if completed would

#### Special Youth Hunt:

12-17 years old

August 14 to August 31 and September 18 & 19

Must have passed a Hunter Safety Course and accompanied by a parent or adult over 21.

#### Bag limit:

One (1) antlered deer per family of youth.

#### Regular Hunts:

Entire month of September & October

#### Bag limit:

One (1) antlered deer per family

in September & October

**Designated hunting allowed for Senior Citizens and handicapped members only.**

### Elk Season

#### Bull Season:

November 1 to November 30

#### Bag limit:

One (1) antlered elk per family

No designated tags will be issued.

#### Antlerless Season:

November 15 to 30

#### Bag limit:

One (1) antlerless elk per family (100 tags available)

Must exchange unused bull tag to receive an antlerless tag.

First come, first served. Only to hunters that have not filled their bull tag and only antlerless elk may be harvested.

**No designated hunting allowed on these tags.**

### Bear Season

Entire month of September, October & November

#### Bag limit:

One (1) bear per family except cubs & sows with cubs are protected.

### Bird Season

September 1 to December 31.

#### Bag limit:

Grouse-3 per day

Quail-10 per day

Chukar-10 per day

Turkey-1 per month

**Migratory birds:** Ducks, Geese, Mourning Dove

Bag limits & season established under the Migratory Bird Treaty Act.

Seasons & bag limits as the same as Federal & State regulations.

#### Restrictions:

Hunting of birds limited to shotguns, archery & pistol fired shot shell.

**The 22,000 acre South Mutton Mt. fire area is closed to all 1999 hunting season.**
