He also loved playing basketball, baseball and keeping busy with his children. He was an avid Mariners fan. ## Buyers beware of offers for old manufactured homes

There have been many offers to tribal members to purchase used manufactured homes, (trailers) or in some cases just offers for no cost at all. First, if the manufactured home is 1976 or older, it does not meet HUD standards for fire life safety issues. Second, the Tribal Credit Department will not do a home loan to set up any of these structures because they attain no value whatsoever. Also there are a number of

safety issues listed below that should be taken into consideration.

The home consists of aluminum wiring that does not stand up to heat very well and can short out and cause a fire.

If the home ignites, the wood paneling inside does not stand up to fire, but acts as a fuel source and doesn't give occupants much time to exit home in a safe manner.

The water pipes do not stand up to cold weather very

well and could leave you with no water and a bill of up to \$5,000 to have the pipes fixed.

The Bonneville Power Administration (BPA) funded each acquisition, as part of BPA's wildlife and fisheries mitigation programs. The Tribes will manage Pine Creek Ranch in perpetuity for wildlife and fish habitat.
