Shinam aq'inushana kutkutpa chi kuuk?
 Shin/-nam / a-/q'inu/-shana / skuul/-pa / chi kuuk
 Who / -you / (s)he- / see / -were / school / -in / today
 Who did you see today at work?

Iq'inushaash Arlita chi kuuk.
Paq'inushaash Dallas ku Suzie chi kuuk.
Paq'inushaash Suzie, Arlita, ku Dallas chi kuuk.
 Today I saw ...

* Notice how the word for "saw" changes: first, referring to only one person, then two, then three or more.
