The Warm Springs Nation Boxing Club had four boxers entered to compete, but only two opponents arrived.

Louis and Jasper Smith had opponent difficulty, their scheduled opponents weren't there at weigh-in. Justin Powers was there though, and so was Mario Crubele.

The scales read 75 pounds

when Leonard American Horse stepped on and Justin Powers was that same weight.

These two boys boxed three one-minute rounds, opening the evening at Tillamook Fair Grounds.

Leonard won the match. Mr. Powers from the Knott Street Boxing Club from Portland showed his courage, but lost for the second time to American Horse.

Bout No. 7 after intermission was the first time either of these two high school boys ever boxed in a sanctioned boxing match.

Mario Crubele, from the

West Eugene Boxing Club vs. Trever Tewee from the Warm Springs club was a very good match at 140 pounds.

To the center of the ring they touched gloves, and at the sound of the bell it was may the best man win.

Trever took a few jabs and right crosses in the first round, being a little shorter of the two means just getting the idea of how to get inside, tuk-tuk.

He did just that in the second round and came very close to ending that fight that round, but Mario had game and heart to hang on, although I think a couple good combinations or

two of a kind may have brought the third man in to play.

Trever won two of the three rounds. Excitement they made when they fought, and for it and their struggle, they got the coaches vote as "Best Fight of the Night" award for the 16 years and under division. Salmon camps provide natural resource training

The OMSI Salmon Camp Research Team is hosting natural resource training programs for Native American high school and middle school students.

For the high school program, ten students will be selected to participate in natural resource management research teams at no cost. This is a chance for students to learn about career opportunities in fisheries and wildlife management. Students will also learn about the many university programs in the natural resources field.

For the high school students, there are three summer program

sessions: June 15 to July 3, at the Hancock Field Station at Fossil; July 6 to July 24, at the Redwood National Park in California; and July 27 to August 14, at San Juan Island, Washington.

In the middle school Salmon Camp, students will spend one week working on restoration habitat in the Pine Creek watershed, owned by the Confederated Tribes of Warm Springs.

These camps will be August 17-22, for ages 13-15, and August 24-29, for ages 10-12.

SmartWood public briefing paper

The following is a public briefing paper for SmartWood Forest Management Certification Assessment of the Confederated Tribes of the Warm Springs Reservation of Oregon.

Introduction:

The SmartWood Program of the Rainforest Alliance is conducting an assessment of the Confederated Tribes of Warm Springs' Forest Management on the reservation.

Scope of the Certification Assessment:

The forest management certification assessment will evaluate the environmental, silvicultural and socioeconomic aspects of the tribally managed forestry operations of the Confederated Tribes, using the Forest Stewardship Council Pacific Coast Working Group Draft 7.9.

To obtain a copy of these guidelines, please contact SmartWood by telephone, fax or e-mail listed below.

The Forest Stewardship Council (FSC) accredits SmartWood, and the Warm Springs assessment process follows procedures approved by the FSC.

Assessment Team Composition:

The assessment will be conducted by a forester, a PhD ecologist, a social scientist and SmartWood senior technical specialist.

All assessment team members have past experience with SmartWood and a minimum of master's level education and relevant field experience.

Assessment Steps and Schedule:

Following is a short description of the certification process and a tentative agenda:

Assessment organization: The SmartWood team will conduct interviews and review available information before departing to field sites for assessment work.

Field assessments: The team will visit sites managed by The Confederated Tribes of Warm Springs.

Final assessment briefing at Warm Springs: Prior to depar-

ture, the team will meet the Confederated Tribes' management to finalize their data collection.

They will not present the final conclusions of the assessment at this time: Those conclusions will come after the report production process.

Draft report production: The assessment team will produce a confidential draft report that will be circulated for comment to owners and a minimum of two independent peer reviewers.

Certification decision: Upon receipt of comments on the draft report from The Confederated Tribes of Warm Springs and independent peer reviewers, SmartWood headquarters will reach a decision on certification.

Public Comment:

SmartWood welcomes input, either public or confidential, on the Confederated Tribes' forest management operations at any stage of the assessment process.

We must, however, receive comments prior to April 15th, 2003 to take them into consideration in reaching a certification decision.

Please submit all comments in writing by post, fax or e-mail to SmartWood West Region Office in Portland. Unless you request otherwise, these comments will be kept confidential and are solely for the purposes of assessing the Confederated Tribes' forest operations.

As fire season approaches, home safety encouraged

With fire season approaching, Warm Springs Fire Management and OSU Extension are offering safety advice to residents.

The advice is intended to help residents reduce the risk of losing homes to wildfire.

The following is a summary

of the precautions that a resident may take. The summary is provided by OSU Extension Service Forestry Agent Steve Fitzgerald.

Landscape your yard with fire-resistant plants in both irrigated and non-irrigated portions of your landscape.

Clean and remove conifer needles and other debris from your roof and gutters annually.

Prune trees up to eight to 10 feet to eliminate "fuel ladders." You can vary the pruning height so your trees are more natural appearing. Reduce the number of native shrubs under trees

and in non-irrigated portions of your property.

Thin trees so there is about 10 feet between tree crowns, and clean up thinning debris.

Consider removing trees up against your house or with branches overhanging the roof, or at least prune branches back.

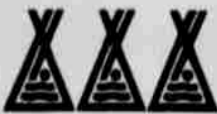
