

Rain is the news from the First Annual Confederated Tribes Horse Sale.

"We don't apologize for the rain, because we need it bad," said auctioneer Rocky Long, who is from The Dalles. "We do apologize for the inconvenience the rain causes."

Only the most determined horse buyers braved the cold rain on Saturday. Despite the inclement weather between 50 and 60 eager horse buyers showed up at the rodeo grounds.

"We faced just about every kind of road block for the sale there is," said Jason Smith, horse owner and manager of tribal Range and Ag. Department.

Even with all the difficulties, they managed to get the job done.

One hundred and fifty six horses were sold for a total of over \$17,000 in about three and a half hours. Range and Ag had been planning on five to six hours to complete the sale. The money will be ploughed directly back into the community.

The horses will be dispersed around the Pacific Northwest. Some horses will travel as far as Texas.

Public safety, police. Supervisor, investigation division. College degree in criminal justice or related field. Ten years of supervisory experience.

## Voc Rehab provides employment services

Warm Springs Vocational Rehabilitation is a federally funded program located in the Tribal Social Services building at the Industrial Park.

Voc Rehab is currently operating in the fifth year of a fiveyear grant. The grant began in October of 1999, and lasts until the end of September, 2004.

The goal of the Voc Rehab program is to assist Native Americans with disabilities to prepare for and engage in gainful employment. This is accomplished when both the counselor and consumer begin identifying and removing barriers that make it difficult for them to obtain employment.

Once these barriers are identified, then Voc Rehab provides vocational services to begin removing those barriers. Types of vocational services authorized by the Warm Springs Vocational Rehabilitation include:

Assessments to determine eligibility and Voc Rehab needs; vocational counseling, guidance and referral services; physical and mental restoration services; vocational and other training, including on-the-job training; maintenance for additional costs incurred while the individual is receiving certain Voc Rehab services; transportation related to other Voc Rehab services; interpreter services for individuals who are deaf; reader services for individuals who are blind; services to assist students with disabilities to transition from school to work, among other services.

Prior to receiving Voc Rehab services individuals must meet the following five eligibility criteria: must be an enrolled Native American in a federally recognized Indian tribe and provide proof of membership; consumer must provide written documentation of a physical or mental impairment; documentation must identify substantial impediments to employment caused by the physical or mental impairment; residence at the time of application must be on the Reservation or within a 65mile radius of the reservation boundaries; and, there must be reasonable expectations that the provision of vocational rehabilitation services will achieve an employment outcome.

To continue educating individuals about the Warm Springs Vocational Rehabilitation program weekly group orientations are held every Monday afternoon from 3 to 4 p.m., or if special circumstances exist, Voc Rehab could schedule a special group/individual orientation.
