Museum offering student internship

The Museum at Warm Springs is sponsoring a 2004 summer intern program for Native American college students. Tribal members are encouraged to apply. The 2004 museum summer intern program provides an opportunity for undergraduate Native American students to explore careers in anthropology,

art, culture and heritage, education, museum or public program development. The program places the intern with the Museum at Warm Springs Education Program. The internship is offered during a ten-week period over the summer. The 2004 museum summer intern is paid \$520 every two weeks.

Requirements to apply for the internship are as follows: A letter of application expressing your interest in the internship, explaining how you can contribute to the Museum at Warm Springs. Proof of enrollment in a higher education institution, and proof of Native American heritage, through enrollment document.

Two letters of recommendation. Letter of application with the documents are due by May 30. Address mail as follows: The Museum at Warm Springs, attention Education Program, P.O. Box 909, Warm Springs, OR 97761. The intern is responsible for his or her own housing during the internship.

Smith offered top job in BIA

While tribes across the United States have been asked to recommend individuals for the post of Commissioner of Indian Affairs, Assistant Interior Secretary Forrest Gerard has indicated he already has someone in mind. That person is the general manager of the Confederated Tribes, Ken Smith. Officially approached by Gerard in mid-November, Smith said recently, "I'm still naking a look at it at this point." He expects to make a decision sometime in the next three weeks. "I'll have to have more communication with Forrest and

maybe one more visit before I'll say yes or no," said Smith. The position of Commissioner of Indian Affairs, which has not been filled since Morris Thompson left in the fall of 1976, is a political appointment ranking just below Gerard in the Indian bureaucracy. The commissioner is responsible for the daily operations of the BIA, which employs 12,500 people nationwide. **Budget uncertain** The 1979 tribal budget became effective Jan. 1, but several programs and positions are on hold until Jan. 24, when

Tribal Council is expected to make a decision on the release of funds. In late September, Council approved the budget package submitted by tribal management with the exception of seven items that were deleted and 18 items held in abeyance pending further justification. And in other news: The new year brought yet another shuffle in the police department but not one of its own choosing. Tribal Council's deletion of the position of assistant chief has resulted in the transfer of Dick Montec, who had filled the slot since August, back to the juvenile program

where he began two years ago. And elsewhere: So you woke up this morning, turned on the lights and nothing happened? Well, all Warm Springs residents who receive electricity from Pacific Power & Light became "unlit" at midnight, Jan. 8. The outage is blamed on a transformer failure. And this: Residents in the West Hills area have reported to the juvenile authorities that children have been abusing the use of BB guns. Because of the possible injuries and damage being done to homes, authorities are asking parents' assistance in cracking down on the problem.
