They go to the museum, the clinic, Power Enterprises and the mill, the Plaza, the longhouses, the area around the resort and Village, and so forth.

An important part of the orientation is the discussion among the employees of the mission of the resort and casino, and how the employees help carry out the mission.

In an introduction to the orientation Kah-Nee-Ta general manager Garland Brunoe explains that the average guest at the resort and casino spends

about \$560 a day. If the guest is a couple, then the amount doubles. And guests usually stay for two days. That is a large amount of money, over \$2,000. And to keep people coming back, the resort has to provide a world-class customer experience, said Brunoe.

The orientation provides some useful advice on how to accomplish the goals of the resort. The advice applies to everyone in the organization, because at some point everyone has some contact with the guests.

How to have the right attitude, and how to make someone's day are some of the essential lessons.

Man charged after infant found smothered

A man charged with killing his infant daughter by rolling over her while he was intoxicated Saturday night appeared in a Montana courtroom Monday.

Anthony Gonzales, 31, was charged with negligent homicide and appeared in Justice Court in Great Falls, Mont., after witnesses discovered him lying on top of the baby, Angelika Lame Bear, while sleeping in bed Saturday night.

Officers on the scene attempted to resuscitate the infant but were unsuccessful.

Gonzales, who is six feet tall and about 230 pounds, allegedly blew a .30 blood-alcohol level when police administered a portable breath test at the scene.

Gonzales appeared in court

via a monitor while in custody at the Cascade County regional jail in Great Falls Monday. A hearing is set for June 10. Bail was set at \$150,000, considering Gonzales's past criminal history and violent record, which includes two years in an Oregon prison for assault with a dangerous weapon, a felony.

The baby's mother, Deanna Lame Bear, was in jail at the time of the incident on an unrelated charge.

The infant, Angelika Lame Bear, was in a backboard-style carrier at the time of her death, according to court documents.

The maximum penalty for negligent homicide is a 20-year prison sentence or a fine of up to \$50,000 or both.
